Aldwark Bridge Circular Walk – Riverside Paths & Hidden Fields

Distance: Approx. 2.7 miles / 4.3 km **Duration:** 1–1.5 hours at a gentle pace

Terrain: Flat riverside track, farm fields, marshy woodland, occasionally overgrown sections

Start/End Point: Aldwark Free Landing

A Route Instructions:

- 1. **Begin your walk at Aldwark Free Landing**, just beside the River Ure near the historic toll bridge. With the river on your right, follow the **riverside path**, keeping the golf course to your left.
- 2. Continue walking with peaceful river views until you reach a **small wooden footbridge**. Cross here and rejoin the path on the far side, soon passing **St Stephen's Church** on your left—a charming Victorian church nestled at the heart of the village.
- 3. Just past the church, **carefully cross the road** and enter **Home Farm** through the wide metal gate. This is a public footpath through private land, so please respect livestock and stay on the marked route.
- 4. **Bear right behind the farmhouse**, then follow the footpath left, keeping a **hedgerow** on your left and an open cow field on your right.
- 5. Continue through a gate and follow a **public right of way across the middle of the next field**. This section can be **overgrown in summer**, but the route is still walkable—just follow the desire line made by other walkers.
- 6. At the far end of the field, you'll come to a **metal pedestrian gate**. Go through and enter a **wooded and marshy area**, home to birds, wildflowers, and butterflies in warmer months. The path here may be muddy after rain, so take care underfoot.
- 7. Follow this **woodland trail**, almost diagonally from the corner you entered the wooded area. Often quite overgrown, but you will emerge into a clearing with the odd rusty farm vehicle. Continue until you emerge at a small pull-in on the **main road to Youlton**.
- 8. **Turn right onto the road** and follow the verge carefully back towards **Aldwark Toll Bridge**, you will pass a right turn to Aldwark Village and a left turn to Linton-on-Ouse, cross the bridge and take in the river views to where your walk began.
