Manila and Rizal.

Did you know that Rotary has created new club models to embrace flexibility, inclusivity, and relevance in today's ever-changing world?

Beyond the traditional Rotary format, these innovative models open doors to a more diverse community of individuals—especially those who may not have found a place in conventional clubs. Though these models have existed for some time, their growth gained remarkable momentum after the 2016 Council on Legislation empowered clubs to embrace flexibility and innovation.

These fresh approaches ensure that Rotary remains vibrant and welcoming, allowing service-minded people from all walks of life to engage, contribute, and lead in ways that fit their passions and lifestyles.

As Rotary continues to evolve, it now recognizes nine different types of clubs:

- Traditional Clubs at the heart of Rotary: a group of professionals and aspiring leaders who meet regularly for service, connections and personal growth.
- Alumni-based Clubs composed of members who were previously involved in Rotary scholarships or programs.
- **Satellite Clubs** sponsored by a traditional club, but with their own meetings, projects, bylaws and board; may also be an impact club that creates significant high impact projects.
- E-Clubs a club with members that meet exclusively online.
- Passport Clubs a club that allow members to attend other Rotary club meetings and service projects, so long as they attend a specified number of meetings in their own club.
- Corporate Clubs whose members are employed by the same employer, but who have different roles in their workplace.
- **Cause-Based Clubs** whose members share a passion for a particular cause and whose service projects and activities center around that cause.
- Interest-based Clubs a club with members who share the same interest or hobby and implements service projects benefitting communities impacted by their interest.
- **Rotaract Clubs** sponsored by Rotary clubs, whose members are aged between 18 and above and who meet together for service, friendship, and connections.



Amid this landscape there are also hybrids of these types – adding further to the diversity of Rotary. RI District 3800 has two Satellite clubs – Waling Waling and Cainta Royale, and a Satellite Impact International Club based in North America. This year, two more satellite clubs are being organized in Zone 1 and Zone 5.

The Rotary Clubs of Valenzuela and Malabon are organizing the first interest-based club: The Rotary Club of Iron Wheels, composed of motorcycle enthusiasts who share a common passion for riding and community service. We will see more of these new Rotarians around – get the drift?

These innovative models reflect Rotary's strategic priorities: increasing impact, widening reach, boosting engagement and improving adaptability.



AV FISTULA CREATION

Medical Mission

Rotary brings life-saving dialysis care.



When the world froze in 2020, a quiet crisis hit kidney patients. Dialysis, demanding, already became dangerous without access to AV fistula creation — a procedure requiring specialized surgeons and resources. In response, Rotary Club Passport One launched a mission with a simple premise: unite medical skill, hospital space, and patient support to provide reliable lifeline for indigent — one fistula at a time.

From a spark of collaboration, the operation became a high-impact project. Rotary Club Passport One partnered with PATACSI (Philippine Association of Thoracic and Cardiovascular Surgeons, Incorporated), whose surgeons volunteered their expertise, and Taytay Doctors Multispecialty Hospital, which provided operating rooms. Serving as the logistics backbone, the club covered medicines, equipment, and costs—creating a sustainable model where no patient is denied care, regardless of ability to pay.

The cost of a single AV fistula surgery ranges from Php 35,000 to Php 65,000, a wide band that reflects the variety of access types and the resources required for each individual case. For many indigent patients, this amount would have been impossible without the mission's subsidized framework. The beneficiaries come from Provincial Hospital Systems in Taytay, Binangonan, and Rodriquez communities where dialysis patients have long faced barriers to timely, lifesustaining interventions.



The mission follows a patient-centered process: pre-surgery exams and consultations assess health and suitability, followed by vein mapping to identify the best vessels. PATACSI surgeons then perform the fistula procedure at Taytay Doctors Multispecialty Hospital. Post-surgery, patients undergo follow-up checks to monitor healing, confirm fistula maturity, and ensure safety.



40 LIVES, 40 LIFELINES: GIVEN HOPE

40 Dialysis Patients Benefited from Rizal Hospitals (RPHS Taytay & MADMH Binangonan)

Preparation is substantial yet essential. About two weeks are devoted to optimization—nutritional support, management of diabetes or hypertension, correction of anemia, and education for patients and families on fistula care and signs of complications. This window of preparation helps ensure that patients enter surgery as stable as possible and leave with a clearer path toward a productive, dialysis—ready life.

The impact of the AV fistula creation mission extends beyond the operating room. It has already saved the lives of over 500 dialysis patients who continue to lead healthier, more productive lives. For families, the benefits are measured in steadier routines, reduced medical anxiety, and the ability to plan for schooling, work, and long-term stability. The project embodies a powerful truth: when clinicians donate their expertise, hospitals provide critical facilities, and donors fund essential care, the result is not just a procedure but a renewed future for entire households.







Rotary Club Passport One maintains an unwavering commitment to sustain and expand this lifeline. As more individual and corporate donors express interest, the program has the potential to reach additional indigent patients across Rizal's hospital systems and beyond. The appeal is simple and urgent: help more dialysis patients access life-saving AV fistula creation. Every contribution-whether financial support, volunteer time, or advocacy—drives a future where no patient's survival hinges on their ability to pay.

In a world that often feels fragmented, this mission stands as a testament to what happens when communities unite for life. It is a call to action to donors, clinicians, and neighbors alike: join the effort to save lives, restore livelihoods, and ensure that every heartbeat has a chance to keep going. SMASHING BONDS OF FELLOWSHIP AT VALLE VERDE 5




BREAKING NEW GROUND:

A DISASTER HOTSPOT AND ROTARY'S BEACON OF HOPE

High Risk, Harrowing Reality

In 2022, the Philippines ranked highest globally in disaster risk according to the World Risk Index, reflecting its significant vulnerability to earthquakes, cyclones, floods, droughts, and sea-level rise. This ranking hasn't changed—by 2024, with an index score reaching 46.91, the country remained the most at-risk nation for the 16th consecutive year.

Storms of July and August 2025

This summer, the Philippines was pounded by multiple tropical cyclones:

- Typhoon Danas (Bising) in early July, it exacerbated the southwest monsoon and affected over 13,000 Filipinos, damaged homes, and tragically claimed a child's life in Las Piñas.
- Typhoon Co-may (Emong) struck in late July, intensified monsoon rains, caused widespread flooding in Luzon, and displaced thousands.
- Typhoon Podul (Gorio) formed in early August; while it affected areas beyond Metro Manila, it contributed to stormy weather conditions.
- PAGASA forecasted up to three cyclones entering the Philippine Area of Responsibility in August.





These storms brought heavy rains and flooding to Metro Manila. Agencies like the DOT and DSWD reported that by late July, around 4,800 tourism workers were affected by the combined impact of cyclones and monsoon floods.

At the heart of these disasters are communities struggling with loss and upheaval. Rotary has stepped in decisively—providing relief, building resilience, and rebuilding hope. Rotary clubs are delivering critical support and comfort.


