PENSION NEWS

The stock market continues to be an adventure. There has been a lot of uncertainty causing concern among investors. Most recently, the turmoil revolved around questions about whether or not Congress and the White House would be able to reach some kind of compromise agreement to raise the debt ceiling and avoid default on our national debt. This would have caused serious repercussions, not only on the US Economy but would have had a devastating effect on the world economies. Fortunately the crisis was averted with the mar-

ket responding accordingly.

A possible recession remains a concern. Many CEOs, investors and economists had penciled in 2023 as the year when a recession would hit the American economy. The thinking was that the US



economy would grind to a halt because the Federal Reserve was effectively slamming on the

brakes to squash inflation. Businesses would lay off workers and inflation-weary Americans would slash spending. Add to that the yield curve has been in a deep inversion for quite some time, a war still rages in Ukraine that no one thought would drag on for as long as it has, the U.S. had two quarters of negative GDP growth in a row last year, there was a banking crisis with multiple bank failures occurring this year, all followed by the debt ceiling showdown.

Despite all of this, as well as other issues that have occurred, the economy and equity markets continue to fight back with great resiliency. In fact, as of early June, both the NASDAQ and S&P 500 entered bull markets, an increase of 20% off their recent lows in 2023.

The case for a 2023 US recession is decreasing as the economy is still looking strong at the halfway point of the year. It is possible the Federal Reserve can pull off a "soft" or "no" landing whereby they slow the economy but do

not overdo it in the near term forcing a recession in the coming quarters. The Fed's war on inflation does have a lag effect meaning that the full effect of the most aggressive interest rate increases in four decades may not have been felt, yet, in the economy. The unemployment rate is expected to tick up up from here, but, that is coming off a multi decades low. At some point there will be a recession again.

All that being said, the Employee Retirement System continues to perform well. As of April 30, 2023, our fund balance is \$796,740,699. Our year to date rate of return is 4.5% and our fiscal year to date rate of return is 9.0%. As always, your Board of Trustees constantly reviews manager performance and looks for opportunities to enhance and increase our return on investment.

I hope everyone has a safe and enjoyable summer. I look forward to seeing you all at the next meeting.




