Our April meeting began with our usual report of officers. We then heard briefly from Rick Williams who gave us a run down on how our organization's investments are fairing in today's everchanging market.


Jim Garavaglia provided our always interesting summation of the month of April. It turns out April was originally the second month of the year until 700BC when two months were added.

PENSION NEWS

As we approach the end of the first half of 2024, there is still a lot of uncertainty in the market. The results have been mostly positive but there have been some hiccups along the way. April was the first negative month since October 2023. United States inflation tracked sideways in April, a sign that Personal Consumption Expenditure (PCE) levels above the Federal Reserve's target could persist into the future. The U.S. economy added 272,000 jobs in May (before being adjusted) which was well above consensus expectations. The unemployment rate ticked up to 4%.

The first quarter saw a slowdown in spending on goods. While services spending remained strong, lower spending on goods (things like cars, food and gasoline) weighed down overall economic growth in the first quarter. Rate expectations are mixed. The Federal Reserve held its policy rate constant at its May meeting. They will meet again in July and September. Investors now expect one or two rate cuts before the end of the year. That is not a universally held expectation and any decision would be

affected by inflation, employment and other contributing factors. Rate cuts are definitely not assured.

Our many and varied investment managers work diligently in a variety of disciplines, every day, to produce positive results from our diverse portfolio. The Board of Trustees monitors and reviews those results, monthly, and make adjustments and changes as necessary resulting in our fiscal year to date performance, net of fees, of 11.8% with a market value of \$853,956,043 as of June, 10, 2024.

Summer is upon us and St. Louis heat and humidity has returned. I hope to see all of you at the annual RECSL picnic August 15, 2024. Until then, stay cool and hydrated.






