Mike Miller (May 8, 1953 – January 18, 2025) was an American rock and jazz guitarist.[1] He worked with <u>Chick Corea</u>, <u>Bette Midler</u>, <u>Yellowjackets</u>,[1] <u>Brand X</u>, <u>Burton Cummings</u>, <u>Vinnie Colaiuta</u>, <u>Quincy</u> <u>Jones</u>, <u>Gino Vannelli</u>, and <u>Vital Information</u>.

Miller was born into a musical family in <u>Sioux Falls, South Dakota</u>. He was the third of four bass-playing brothers, performing with his father's jazz band at the age of twelve and in garage bands in his teens. He played bass in the Sioux Falls Symphony.[2]

Miller died of a heart attack on January 18, 2025, at the age of 71.[3]

Career

In 1972, Miller moved to <u>Colorado</u>, where he played with <u>Larry Coryell</u>, <u>Robben Ford</u>, <u>Bill Frisell</u>, Bruce Fowler, Tom Fowler, and Steve Fowler. He recorded the album Fly On with the band <u>Air Pocket.[4][5]</u> He moved to <u>Los Angeles</u> in 1975.[2] In California, he worked with <u>Max Bennett</u>, <u>Brand X</u>, <u>Bobby</u> <u>Caldwell</u>, <u>Alphonso Johnson</u>, <u>Bennie Maupin</u>, <u>Airto Moreira</u>, <u>Shawn Phillips</u>, and <u>Tom Scott.[2]</u> In 1981, Miller began eleven years of working with pop singer <u>Gino Vannelli</u>, touring and recording five albums. In 1983 he wrote "Elamar" for the <u>Yellowjackets</u> album Mirage a Trois. Three years later he started a trio called The Outsidemen, releasing the live album Band Overboard (1996)[2][6][7] In 1993, Miller joined Chick Corea for the album Elektric Band II: Paint the World (1993).[7][8][9][10][11] In 1990s Miller performed the music of <u>Frank Zappa</u> as a member of Banned from Utopia with the <u>Seattle Symphony</u>, the <u>Portland Symphony</u>, and the <u>Israel Philharmonic Orchestra</u>. With the <u>Royal Philharmonic Orchestra</u> he recorded a guitar concerto by <u>Joseph Curiale</u> and with the Los Angeles Philharmonic New Music Group he was a soloist alongside <u>Peter Erskine</u> for the album Blood on the Floor by <u>Mark-Anthony Turnage.[2][12][13][14][15]</u>

At the end of the 1990s, he was involved in scoring <u>Jessica Yu</u>'s documentaries Breathing Lessons and The Living Museum. He toured with <u>Bette Midler</u> and appeared on her album Bette. He also worked with film composer <u>Mark Mothersbaugh</u> on <u>The Adventures of Rocky and Bullwinkle</u> (2000) and <u>The Royal Tenenbaums</u> (2001).[2] Marsis Jazz released his first solo album, Save the Moon, in 2001. He was a touring guitarist with <u>Boz Scaggs</u> since 2014 and has worked with <u>Brandon Fields</u>, <u>Mitchel</u> <u>Forman</u>, <u>Scott Kinsey</u>, <u>Otmaro Ruíz</u>,[7] and <u>Queen Latifah</u>.

In the early-2000s, Miller played custom-made instruments, some with <u>Seymour Duncan</u> pickups, as well as a <u>Martin D-28</u>. He used effects made by Danish company Emma and by <u>Line 6.[7][16]</u>
