DOREEN BAINGANA Playwright 'Tropical Fish'

Doreen Baingana is a writer, editor and arts manager whose short story collection, Tropical Fish, won a Grace Paley Prize and a Commonwealth Prize for Best First Book, Africa Region.

Other awards include three nominations for the Caine Prize, the most recent in June 2021; a Sustainable Arts Foundation Grant, 2021; a Rockefeller Bellagio Residency in 2017 and a Miles Morland Scholarship for African Writers in 2014.

She has also published two children's books, as well as fiction and essays in numerous international journals.

Ms. Baingana has a law degree from Makerere University, Kampala, and an MFA in Creative Writing from the University of Maryland, USA, where she was later a Writer-in-Residence. In 2016, Ms. Baingana co-founded and is the Director of the Mawazo Africa Writing Institute, based in Entebbe. Ms. Baingana embraced theatre when her short story, Tropical Fish, was performed at the Writivism Festival and Kampala International Theatre Festival (KITF) in 2016, and three other venues in Kampala and the AfriCologne Theatre Festival in 2017. Another play, Hills of Salt and Sugar was staged at KITF in 2018. Further, Questions of Home is forthcoming this year in the anthology Telling Our Stories of Home: International Performance Pieces by and about Women edited by Kathy A. Perkins. In 2020, Ms. Baingana received a Tebere Arts Foundation Playwright's Residency to fully adapt Tropical Fish to the stage, and is excited to continue this process to production with Tebere in 2021.

Mshai Mwangola is a talented performance scholar, storyteller, and oraturist. She has performed, conducted performance workshops, researched and worked with and for diverse performance ensembles and individuals in four continents and has a career stretching over 25 years in acting, directing and story-telling.

Mshai holds a PhD in Performance Studies from Northwestern University (USA). Her thesis on Kenya's "Uhuru Generation", titled 'Performing Our Stories, Performing OurSelves', approaches the idea of a generational historical mission through the recreation, invocation and facilitation of performance as a site of individual and communal reflection. Prior to this, she obtained an MCA (Masters of Creative Arts) from the School of Studies in the Creative Arts, University of Melbourne (Australia) and a Bachelor of Education (Hons) from Kenyatta University (Kenya).

Mshaï's pedagogy, research and creative work is grounded in understanding performance as both the process and product of meaning-making. Her specialties as an academic researcher include; Teaching experience at multiple levels (kindergarten to university), Theatre director and actor; Performance scholar and educator; Oraturist with particular interest in storytelling,

NANSUBUGA Co-Director

Sarah Nansubuga holds a Bachelor of Dramatic Arts Degree from the University of the Witwatersrand (Johannesburg, SA), and has recently graduated with an MFA in Acting from Louisiana State University (August 2019). Following her Graduation, she acquired a position at the Algiers Charter School Association as the primary Theater

and Dance instructor for Grades K-12 (2019-2020), during which she was solely responsible for creating curricula, curating lesson plans and engineering student productions for learners in this grade bracket. Outside instructional time. Sarah worked actively on the New Orleans theater scene as an actor and theater maker, having most recently appeared as the titular character in Southern Rep's Mother Courage and her Children, in addition to writing and submitting an original piece for The Breath Project (2020). She is a member of the Acting Company under Southern Reparatory Theatre in New Orleans, having appeared in Danai Gurira's Eclipsed as Maima, and the aforementioned Mother Courage. Other notable theatre roles include Miss Ruby in Airline Highway, Thomasina (understudy) in Arcadia and Lysistrata in Lysistrata. She has since returned home to Uganda and has joined founder Aganza Kisaka under Yenze Theatre Conservatoire as an Acting / Voice / Movement Instructor and course curriculum curator. In Uganda, she has most recently appeared in Key Card (2021), a precursor for the upcoming feature film Black Glove (2021), and has been involved in several writing projects. Sarah is ecstatic to come on board as a Mentor for the Emerging Artist Lab at Tebere Arts, and looks forward to interacting with and learning from students and fellow Mentors.

Atukunda Pamela Hannah is an everyday student of art, a writer, stage manager, and director. She is doing stage management on the Tropical Fish production.

She has done stage management for Betrayal in the City and The Government Inspector at the Uganda national theatre 2016. Pamela has written radio dramas for Kubri Bridge in South Sudan 2017. She also attended the intensive emerging artist in 2019 under which she worked as the assistant director for the Redhills production. She wrote Cryptic during the Tebere Lab, a story which was told in the African summer camp in Amsterdam August 2021

Esteri Tebandeke has performed in various theatre productions. From Lion and Jewel to Maria Kizito by playwright Erik Ehn that she performed on stage in New York and New Orleans.

She also portrayed young girl Maria in a play Cooking Oil by a Ugandan playwright Asiimwe Deborah Kawe on stage here in Uganda and in Los Angeles. Marriage Chronicles by playwright Samuel Tebandeke and Conversations with my Mother a play she co-wrote with Samuel Tebandeke.







LULU JEMIMAH Actress

Lulu Jemimah is a writer, editor and producer from Uganda. She started out as a freelance journalist and after a decade, worked as a communication consultant for the International Organisation for Migration on human trafficking.

This is where she experimented with writing scripts for radio, screen and the stage. In 2013, this earned her a BA Media (film) scholarship from Macquarie University (Australia), where she was later shortlisted for the 2015 Monash Undergraduate Prize for Creative Writing. In 2019, she graduated from the Masters in Creative Writing program at the university of Oxford where she majored in audio storytelling.


