New Program at Sams House “Touch Tables”

Guests are encouraged to touch, look, and sometimes smell some of the unique items on the table displays. Each month a different and interesting natural theme will be featured.

Florida Pioneer Christmas'



At Sams House history is shared about Pioneer life and how things were done back in the late 1800's, including how early day pioneers might celebrate the Christmas season.

We tend to think that Christmas has always been a holiday for us. Historically, several states had declared Christmas a legal holiday, and finally the Florida Legislature did so in 1881.

In Florida, it was a time when many families and friends lived a few miles apart and it could take hours to ride a horse, or wagon, or boat to come together for special occasions. Community gatherings were referred to as "frolicks." Festive meals were often followed by music and dancing.

Gifts exchanged were mostly handmade or grown items including fruit, cakes, and nuts, sewn items, or carved wooden objects.

Christmas trees were local pine or cedar, and decorated with homemade and natural ornaments like palmetto frond, magnolia branches, citrus fruit, paper and popcorn chains, and lit candles for lights. (which were dangerous and had to be monitored carefully).

Our Mattie's Diary has short references about Christmas in Chapter 3. "Uncle Jim and family stayed at Eau Gallie tho, his older sons worked at the syrup making. But we did not go till after Christmas. Mamma and Sister had a tree for us. Sister made candles from wax from a wild beehive, and Mamma made a little present for each of us." Mattie also added about visitors: "The boys' mothers came also, and how delighted they all were with our little tree" "And Henry Casper said it was the most beautiful thing he had ever seen. Mamma and sister also made candy and cookies with syrup as we had no sugar."

Another way to reflect on Pioneer Christmas is to attend the 47th Annual Cracker Christmas festival in Christmas, FL this December 6 & 7. Martha Pessaro and Denise Christopher, PIPS board members, will staff a PIPS/EEL display promoting Sams House. Exhibitors for this fun-filled pioneer festival will feature: weaving, cane grinding, syrup making, spinning, wood carving, lace making, broom making, blacksmithing and more. An event similar to our Pioneer Day currently planned for February 7.

- **Saturday Bird Walks at Sams House** - Every Saturday 9:00 -10:00 am. Join the Naturalist Staff (weather permitting) to look and listen for birds around the nature center. From beginner to expert, all levels of birders are welcome. Bring your own binoculars (a limited number are available for loan). Meet in front of the cabin and the white house.

- **Scavenger Hunt** - Every Sunday 10:00 am – 4:00 pm. Stop by the 1888 house to pick up your nature hunt. Enjoy the afternoon exploring the grounds.

- **House and Cabin Tour** - Every Thursday and Saturday at 3:00 pm. Tour the inside of Brevard County's oldest standing home (1875) and the adjacent (1888) Florida vernacular-style home to learn about the Sams Family.



Kashanian Scholarship

Brazilian Peppertree Eradication



The Brazilian peppertree is native to South America. It was introduced to Florida in the 1840's as an ornamental plant and often used for Christmas decorations due to its attractive foliage and red berries.

However it has become an aggressive, invasive species especially in Florida where it disrupts ecosystems.

The seeds consumed by wildlife, especially birds, spread new plants to natural areas taking over native tree hammocks, pine flatlands and mangroves.

An eradication program will take place on the Pine Island Conservation Area. The Central Region has been awarded over \$100,000 through the USDA Integrated Pest Management (IPM) project to help with Brazilian peppertree management efforts. This will cover a little over 283 acres around the north lake of PICA. The project is projected to begin in April 2026.

You are encouraged to work on Brazilian peppertree eradication in your area.
