

Turtle Race



Curious, she walked over to it and peered inside. A little sparrow was sitting at the bottom of the trash can, chirping its heart out. Its right wing stuck out from its body at a strange angle. Reaching in, she cupped the bird in her hands and lifted it out. The bird was terrified. She then cooed to it, so it would not be scared. A few gentle strokes on the head later, the bird's initial frantic flapping stopped and it rested contentedly in Jenny's hand. Jenny decided to bring it home and ask her mother for permission to keep it. The sparrow chirped all the way to her house, its little fuzzy head poking through Jenny's fingers.

Without really looking at the bird, Jenny's mother said "No way! I am not having an animal in the house." However, once she had a closer look at those big, sad eyes, she changed her mind. Jenny was counting on that. Her mother gently set the sparrow on the kitchen table to get a better look at it. Its right wing was definitely broken, so Jenny's mother designed a splint out of an ice-cream stick and carefully taped it to its wing. Once the splint was on, Jenny fed the bird water and gave it bits of bread. At first, it would not eat, but then after a while, it would not stop.

The little bird was given the name "Peep". Jenny kept it in an old hamster cage, the former home of Pepper, the hamster, which had recently passed away from old age. Every night, she put a towel over the cage, and Peep went right to sleep. Every morning, she put its cage outside and opened the door so it could wander around and get some fresh air. Peep could not fly, which seemed to frustrate it. It was also not used to walking everywhere.

Soon, Peep's wing got better, and Jenny's mother said it was probably time to take off the splint. Jenny watched anxiously as they put Peep on the kitchen table, and her mother cut off most of the splint with a pair of scissors. She could not remove all of it. There were also bits of white tape stuck to Peep's wing, but it did not seem to mind. It started flapping its wing enthusiastically, and the next morning when she opened the cage door, it flew a few metres into the air before coming back. Jenny watched from the ground like a proud parent. From then on, Peep flew a bit further each morning, but it always came back shortly after.

Two weeks later, when Jenny let Peep out of its cage, it just kept flying. She left the cage outside with the door open, but it never came home at all that day. As it became dark, she faced the reality that Peep would never come back. Her mother said it had probably found some other sparrows and decided it was time to be with them.
