





Mary came from a humble background and she married a man who could only afford a simple lifestyle. She spent hours dreaming about a more extravagant lifestyle and desired owning jewellery and expensive clothing. As she owned neither of them, she felt worthless.

One night, her husband returned home with an invitation to a party. He hoped that Mary would be thrilled with the chance to attend it, but she scolded him for accepting the invitation. She told her husband that she had nothing to wear, so he should give the invitation to one of his friends whose wives could afford better clothing. Although her husband was taken aback by her reaction, he asked her how much a suitable dress would cost. She contemplated it for a long time. Then, she told him that four hundred dollars would be enough. He was greatly shocked and complained that it was exorbitant. However, he finally relented and gave her the money to buy it.

As the day of the party approached, Mary became anxious as she was worried about what others thought of her because of her lack of jewellery. Her husband suggested that she visit their neighbour, Mrs Fong, to borrow something suitable for her to wear. Mary reluctantly did. Mrs Fong gladly lent her a diamond necklace. Overcome with gratitude, Mary thanked her profusely and promised to return it that night.

At the party, Mary was the most beautiful woman. Everyone noticed and complimented her on her outfit and she was smiling throughout the event. Soon, it was time to go. Mr Lim covered her shoulders with her shawl to keep her warm as they left. Mary was embarrassed by the old shawl. Wanting to slip away unnoticed, she quickly followed her husband out of the host's house.

Returning home, Mary removed her shawl. To her horror, she discovered that the necklace was no longer around her neck. In a panic, her husband went outside to retrace their steps. Terrified, she sat and waited for him. He returned home much later in an even greater panic—he could not find the necklace. He instructed her to call Mrs Fong and say that she had broken the clasp of the necklace and was getting it mended at a jeweller's.

They continued to look for the necklace over the next few days. After a week, they decided to replace it. They visited many jewellery shops, searching for a similar one, and finally found one. It cost twenty thousand dollars. The Lims spent a month borrowing from friends to raise the sum. Finally, Mr Lim purchased the necklace. When Mary returned the necklace in its case to Mrs Fong, the latter was annoyed at how long it took Mary to return it. She kept the case but did not bother to check the jewellery. Relieved, Mary left in a hurry.

The Lims began to live a life of extreme poverty. They could not afford their apartment so they immediately sold it to get some money. After that, both of them held two jobs each. Their misery lasted ten years, but finally, they repaid their debts. The years of struggle had taken its toll on her health and beauty. Mary looked haggard.

One Sunday, while she was out for a walk, Mary spotted Mrs Fong. Mary approached her and greeted her. Mrs Fong did not recognise her at first. When Mary identified herself, Mrs Fong could not help but exclaim that she had aged so much. Mary whimpered that the change was because of Mrs Fong's jewellery. Then, she explained to Mrs Fong the long saga of losing the necklace, and working for years to repay the debt. At the end of her story, Mrs Fong clasped Mary's hands and said, "You should have told me! The original necklace was just a piece of costume jewellery, and cost only thirty dollars!" Upon hearing that, Mary realised that she could have avoided years of misery if she had not tried to cover things up. It was a painful lesson learnt.


