At first, I played on chunky Chinese keyboards — cheap, but the best we could afford. Later, my parents bought me a Swedish piano, but half the strings on it soon ended up broken. My parents and teacher realised that I had to leave my hometown to realise my potential. To be a serious musician, I would have to move to Beijing.</p>	5
<p>My father, the lead violinist of an orchestra, warned me that the journey would not be easy. With millions of pianists in China vying for fame, competition would be fierce. On top of that, many sacrifices were involved. At just eight years of age, it did not occur to me just how much we had to give up and so, I was undeterred and raring to go. To relocate to Beijing with me, my father quit his beloved job, while my mother stayed behind to work and support us.</p>	10
<p>Suddenly, my father and I became outsiders. To the locals, we spoke with funny northern accents. The only apartment we could find with the money we had was an unheated building, with five families sharing one bathroom. My father cooked, cleaned and looked after me. He became a housewife, basically.</p>	15
<p>We lived far from my school, and to save on bus fares, my father would 'drive' me on his bicycle every day. It was an hour-and-a-half trip each way, and I was a heavy boy. He did this in winter too. Imagine that! During the coldest nights, he would lie in my bed to warm it up so that the bed would not be ice-cold when I could finally retire for the night.</p>	20
<p>Trying as these circumstances were, they were not the root of my misery. My new teacher in Beijing often told me, "You have no talent. You will never be a pianist." I was only nine years old then. Devastated, I decided that I did not want to do it anymore. I wanted to go home to my mother. For the next two weeks, I did not touch the piano. Wisely, my father did not push me. He just waited.</p>	25
<p>Sure enough, that day came at school when my teacher asked me to play some holiday songs. I did not want to, but as I placed my fingers on the keyboard, I realised I could show other people that I had talent after all. That day, I told my father what he had been wanting to hear — that I wanted to try again with another teacher. From that point on, everything turned around and I progressed by leaps and bounds.</p>	30
<p>With the encouragement of the new teacher, we signed up for an international competition. We still had very little money so my father had to borrow five thousand dollars to pay for a trip to the International Young Pianists Competition in Germany, in 1994, when I was twelve. I realised later how much pressure he was under as I watched footage of the contest. His face lit up and tears streamed down his face when it was announced that I had won, earning enough money to pay back our loan.</p>	35

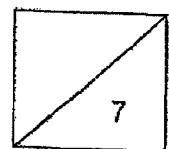

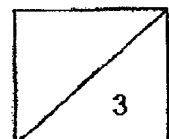
