To me, Grandma's house was my second home. I had spent my entire childhood living at Grandma's and I used to visit her often even through adulthood. Standing at the front door, I stared at the twisted vines that crept up the exterior of the house, trying to devour the entire structure. Yet it seemed as though this little house stood unshaken against the test of time – just like Grandma. She always stood firm in her beliefs.

I fondly remembered how warm and loving Grandma was, preparing my favourite meals and always ready to lend a listening ear. Her unconditional love for me was something I treasured.

The door creaked open, and Grandma's blank eyes met mine. I looked deep into her eyes, hoping to see the woman who was once full of life. Now, she was a shell of her former self. Her gaze dropped to a photograph of me in her hand. She took another glance at me. Leaving the door open, she walked back into the house. I took that as my cue to enter.

The familiarity of the place struck me. I remembered the hint of jasmine in the air. It made me feel at ease, at home. I caught sight of the patchwork quilt that Grandma had painstakingly sewn together for me over months. It was what kept me warm at night during my childhood. Yet a wave of unfamiliarity hit. I looked over at Grandma, still staring blankly at the photograph. I wanted to be a part of Grandma's life once again. I was prepared for battle. I searched for more photographs of our good times together in the hope of jogging her memory. I showed her many videos of us that I had in my mobile phone. I tried all I could.

She still gazed blankly at me. The truth was clearer than water. She had no recollection of me at all. Tears welled up in my eyes and threatened to course down my cheeks. My heart shattered. The battle was lost.

I knew she would forget even this in a matter of time, for the illness would continue to claim her memories. But no matter what, she would still be my beloved grandma, and I could tell that she wanted to persevere and so would I.

"Bethany, your granddaughter," I responded, accepting her outstretched hand with a smile. Even if Grandma could not remember the good times we shared, I could. Those memories were mine to keep. Perhaps, the battle was not completely lost.
