





except in places such as the Antarctica where it is simply too cold for them to

Ants look tiny and harmless, contrary to popular belief, ants can be
harmful. Ants are capable of transmitting diseases. They are also known tofood (54)
with bacteria such as E. coli and Salmonella, and people may fall ill consuming such food.
In general, the typical homeowner does not usually think too much about the possibility of
disease by ants. Thus, we should be wary that ants ultimately have one (55)
objective: to for food and moisture; these elements secure the survival of the
colony. However, this behaviour may take them to some of the less hygienic sections of their habitats.
For instance, some ants prefer to infest the bathrooms and kitchens in our homes, so
