I stared lovingly at the precious child, then at the storm outside. As the rain poured heavily, I snuggled Sally and her little brother, Asher, into their mother's old bed. Knowing it was going to be a frosty night, the thick blanket would keep their little bodies warm. Reluctant to have Sally go to bed feeling dejected, I thought of how to lift her spirits. Right then, I knew just the story to tell them.

"I want to tell you the story of Jadav Payeng. He was my biggest inspiration when I was your age, Sally. You see, we didn't have robot machines that planted trees at a massive rate **then**, like we do now. Trees had to be manually grown, and it wasn't easy, but this man didn't just plant trees; he grew an entire forest - The Molai Forest!"

"Wow! Grandma, how was **that** possible? Did he do it alone?" Asher asked, his eyes glistening in excitement.

"Yes! He did it all by himself. In 1979, the forestry division launched a scheme of tree plantation on 200 hectares of land. Jadav was among the labourers involved in this project. Sally then recalled her teachers talking about Jadav Payeng in class. They told her that poachers came to hunt for rhinos in his forest. Jadav alerted the forest department, and the officials caught them.

"I'm glad his efforts were noticed, especially when he did not give up despite failing countless times," Asher added, glancing at Sally and giving her a mischievous smile.

Sally's face reddened. She now realised why I had told them this story. Her face lit up and she suddenly exclaimed, "I'll try planting more trees tomorrow. I want to be the Forest Girl of Singapore!"

Asher and I laughed. I smiled to myself, happy that she had understood what I was driving at.




