Every Saturday morning, I watched Mum coach her gymnastics class. She moved so gracefully around the gymnasium that it was not hard to believe she had once been an Olympic gymnast. That day, though, something seemed different. The familiar scent of rubber mats filled the air, but she had lost her usual bounce.

The early morning sun streamed through the high windows. Medals and trophies from years past lined the walls. Among them, proudly displayed in the center, was Mum's Olympic silver medal from Beijing 2008. I remembered how she used to let me wear it when I was little, telling me stories about her journey to the podium.

"One more time, girls!" she called out, demonstrating a simple cartwheel.

As she landed, she stumbled slightly and forced a smile. I saw how she was attempting to put less weight on her right ankle. The students did not notice it, but I did. It was the same ankle that had carried her through countless routines, but now seemed to be failing her.

My mind wandered back to when I was six, afraid to even do a forward roll. The gymnasium had seemed enormous then. Mum would spot me, her hands ready to catch me if I fell. When I had crashed during my first competition on the balance beam, she had been there at the edge of the mat, encouraging me to continue. The memory was still vivid – the hushed audience, and my trembling legs as I stood up again.

"Every great gymnast falls, Sophie," she had whispered then, "but only the best ones get back up."

The gymnasium's mirrors reflected the morning light, just as they had done all those years ago. I remembered watching her practise after hours, chalking up her hands and working on the balance beam. She would flip and twist through the air as if gravity did not exist, making the impossible look effortless.

Now, watching her massage her ankle between demonstrations, I understood why she had been doing more coaching and less demonstrating lately. Her body was not responding the way it used to. The doctor's words from last week echoed in my mind - "Bone injury isn't healing well" - but Mum had simply nodded and asked the doctor about modified exercises. That was her way of looking forward and finding solutions.

"Coach Chen," one of the younger students called out, her ponytail bouncing with excitement, "Can you show us the back handspring again?"

I saw Mum hesitate for just a moment, something she had never done before. A flash of pain crossed her face, so brief that only someone who knew her well would notice. Before she could respond, I stepped onto the mat.

"Let me show you how," I offered, moving to the center. As I performed the move, I channeled everything she had ever taught me - the control, the grace in every movement. From the corner of my eye, I saw her watching me, and for a moment, I was that six-year-old again, desperate to make her proud.

During the next exercise, when she asked for a volunteer to demonstrate a sequence, I raised my hand again.

"Let me show them, Mum," I said, performing the combination she had taught me years ago. The younger students followed my lead, their faces showing the same determination I once had. I heard Mum giving advice, just as clear and confident as ever, guiding the next generation of gymnasts.


