Designed for environments with limited teaching support, the activity books are intuitive, visually rich, and encourage independent exploration.

Children learn language, science, arts, and critical thinking through a single, coherent storyline — one that honors local culture while connecting them to the world.

# OUR LOCAL INTERVENTION AREAS

## **Dzaleka Refugee Camp – Area A**

Initial pilot site of the program, supporting over 300 children in overcrowded classrooms by providing structured learning tools.

## **Learning Hub – ACCB Church**

A central coordination hub for distributing learning materials, training volunteers, and supporting educators.

## **Dzaleka Camp – Zone B**

Focused support for newly arrived refugee children with limited access to education, ensuring early integration into learning pathways.

## **Community Service Alliance**

Provides mobile outreach, field support, and logistical assistance to reach remote or underserved sections of the camp.

## Reach and Influence of the Initiative

### Year 1: Foundational Community Engagement (2024)

Collaborative groundwork with refugee leaders and volunteer educators to identify educational needs and co-design the initiative.

### Year 2: Pilot Launch and Educational Delivery (2025)

Distribution of illustrated educational booklets and Student Learning Kit to 901 refugee children, in partnership with 3 local community centers.
