Hampden-Sydney Tigers Look Back at the 2020-2021 Football Season

Just like college athletics across the country Hampden-Sydney's season was a couple positive tests away from being over, "We were 50/50 if we would even get to play in the spring," said Head Coach Marty Favret. In his Twenty-Firstst year as the Head Football Coach at Hampden-Sydney, while being the second most winning coach in the program's history Favret knows what each season has to offer to his players and their fans. This left it up to the players individually to continue to work and get better without having the motivation of coaches and teammates. At a meeting near the beginning of the season with coaches and leaders of the team present the group made a plan, and as Costello put it, the plan was "win the day."

Being a Senior Captain and the Student Body President of Hampden-Sydney, your voice is going to carry weight. That being said, just like many of his teammates, when Phil Pullen first found out the season was canceled he thought his football career was over, "The sport I had been playing my entire life has been taken away from me and there's nothing I can do about it." This left Phil, as well as his teammates a choice, they could either assume they were done playing the game or hold on to hope that they would get another chance to play. For Pullen and his

teammates, the choice was obvious, "It gave me six months to get better," as Pullen put it. For captains and leaders on the team Dillon and Phil's decision was echoed from top to bottom, "Everyone drank the juice."

For seniors on the team, the fact this was their last outing might be enough alone to come out swinging. Although for younger guys on the team, who might not play in a game either way, it's easy to see how their decision to buy in on a season filled with potential illness and mystery could be difficult. Dealt a hand he had no say in, Coach Favret was left with a potential hefty task. Looking these young members of his team in the eyes, Favret gutted out "Instead of three weeks to get ready you now have six months." This left the underlining message with these members of the team that their expectation was that they need to be more prepared and developed after this season. Which Favret looks back on as being one of the teams' main building points going into the fall.

With all the difficulties going into the spring season, it seemed like one of the last things on people's mind was how good is the team even going to be. Favret is a coach known for having confidence in his teams, even when the rest of the world might not. Coming into "The Game" records and external factors can be put aside when Hampden-Sydney and Randolph-Macon have their annual contest.
