Applicants must provide essential information while filling out the form, including the student's name, parents' names, residential address, date of birth, and details of the last school attended, if applicable. Providing Aadhaar details and the child's bank account information is optional but recommended. A valid mobile number of the parent or guardian is mandatory.

The DoE has specified age limits for admission (as of March 31, 2026) without relaxation:

Class 6: Between 10 and 12 years

Class 7: Between 11 and 13 years

Class 8: Between 12 and 14 years

Class 9: Between 13 and 15 years

DELHI SCHOOLS BEGIN NON-PLAN ADMISSIONS FOR CLASSES 6-9

The admission process will be conducted in three phases. The last date to apply in the first phase is April 7.

The Directorate of Education (DoE), Delhi, has started the registration process for non-plan admissions to Classes 6 to 9 in government schools. Eligible students can apply online through the official portal within the specified deadlines.

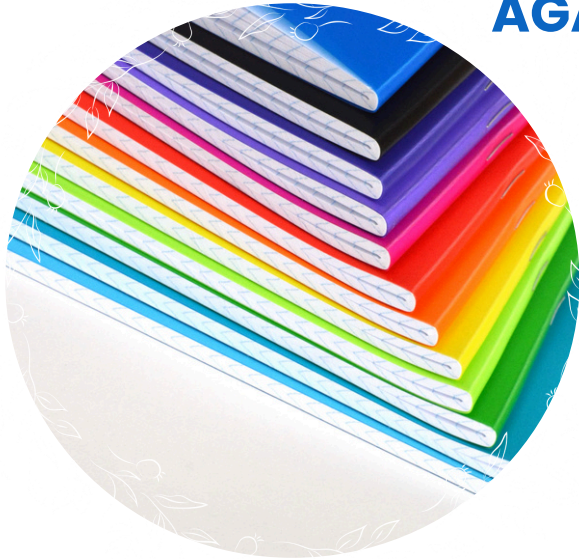
The second phase of registration will be held from April 30 to May 25, while the third phase will run from July 1 to July 25.

Parents and guardians seeking admission for their children must submit applications through the DoE's official website by accessing the "Govt School Admissions".

For Classes 6 to 9, students must have been promoted from the previous class to be eligible for online registration. Children who are currently out of school can register physically at the nearest government school. Such students, particularly those aged between 10 and 14 years who have not attended school, will undergo an assessment of Foundational Literacy and Numeracy. Their class of admission will be decided based on this evaluation.

DELHI GOVT DIRECTS PVT SCHOOLS AGAINST MANDATING PURCHASES FROM SPECIFIC VENDORS



The Delhi government on Wednesday instructed private unaided recognised schools in Delhi not to mandate purchase of books, uniforms or any other educational material from specific vendors, citing complaints from parents over the practice. In a bid to ensure that parents and students have options, it said that the schools will also have to display the names, addresses and telephone numbers of at least five vendors or shops near the school where the items are available.

CBSE TO INTRODUCE THIRD LANGUAGE OPTION IN CLASS 6 FROM 2026-27 SESSION UNDER NEP 2020

The Central Board of Secondary Education introduced a third language option for students in Class 6 in accordance with the National Education Policy 2020, which calls for multilingual learning from the early years of schooling. The new system restructures how languages are taught in schools, aiming to promote multilingual learning while ensuring flexibility for students. Under the updated framework, languages will be categorised into three levels:

- R1 (First Language): Any language offered by CBSE
- R2 (Second Language): Must be different from R1
- R3 (Third Language): Must be different from both R1 and R2

Importantly, at least two of the three languages must be Indian languages, reinforcing the policy's focus on linguistic diversity. CBSE has also clarified that the same language cannot be studied at more than one level simultaneously. A key change in the policy is the compulsory introduction of the third language (R3) from Class 6, starting in the 2026-27 academic session.
