(Traditional & Online Service) Build Disciples, Part One ● The First Sunday in Lent Matthew 28:16-20; John 13:35; 1 Thessalonians 5:12-24 "Live like a Disciple" Being a disciple means living that kind of life.

(online only) Preparation for Worship

Gather these items for worship. If you don't have a particular item, fret not:

- a piece of white cloth
- an end table or stand
- a plate with bread
- a cup with juice
- a glass or bowl of water
- a lighter/match

- a driver's license
- a computer or internetaccessible device
- a thank you card to God for something this week

For each item you have, thank God for the provision. For each piece you do not have, thank God you don't need it. Place the table/stand in the area you plan to worship. If more than one person will be present, place the table in the middle of where you will be seated. Drape the cloth over it. Arrange the cup, plate, glass of water, and other items on the table. Keep the Bible in front of you. Be ready with enough Communion elements for each person in your household.

Questions for the announcement loop

In preparing for Worship, consider the following:

- What are the limits on what you can do as a disciple of Jesus Christ?
- What do you have left to learn as a disciple? What are you doing to learn it?
- What could someone learn about being a disciple from observing your life?
- Can building disciples happen at a distance or must you be close?


We are glad you are here! Our nursery is in the Education Building and our restrooms are in the other buildings as well (if you need them).

You give us time for which we didn't ask, strengths we sometimes won't use, wisdom we won't heed. Forgive us when we reject your gifts. May we come to reflect your generosity as enthusiastically as we receive it. Thank you for listening, God. Amen.

Sermon: "Live like a Disciple"

As some of you know, my parents are ailing and from time to time my siblings and I make a pilgrimage to check on them. Recently when taking my turn, I got everything ready for the trip to West Virginia. I had cash for the toll booths, I had snacks for the road, I had the music playlist I put together and my maps app showed up as expected on my car's display. It wasn't until I stopped for gas that I realized that my wallet had fallen out of my pants and was sitting there peacefully at the end of my bed. I was already halfway to Mom and Dad's. Given my circumstances, I thought it best not to draw too much attention to myself and so I drove the speed limit the rest of the way. I wasn't TOO worried: I did have a legal driver's license. It's just that the actual card wasn't with me. Nevertheless, I still felt vulnerable, in violation, wrong.

It's not that having the license made me into something I'm not. In fact, I didn't suddenly gain powers I didn't earn. I had to pass the written test. I had to pass the sign and vision tests. I had to pass the driving test. I had to have the proper documentation and training. I had to have the service fee. And even after I got the thing, I still had to practice, had to *gain experience*. Having the license didn't turn me into an expert driver. All it says is that, as far as the state of NC is concerned, I'm allowed to try.

Y'all, our faith functions the same way.

Sure, my baptism and profession of faith makes me part of the family. I am possessed of God's Spirit same as any of you. I have access to Bibles (just about any translation you can imagine), study materials, I've been on mission trips, I have the benefit of the wisdom and experience of others, I mean, I even carry the label of-dare I say it?-*Christian*.

I am a follower of Jesus Christ.

So, that's it, right? There's just not much else to do. Some paperwork to identify my color preferences for my digs in Heaven and filling out the online survey. Oh, and there's the HOA fee. But outside of that, that's all there is to it. Once I'm labeled a Christian there's just not anything else for me to achieve or work out. Right?

We of course KNOW this is not so. **Being a disciple of Jesus Christ is far more than just what we call ourselves.** It's about what God calls us to *do*. Sure, I have a certificate on my wall that says I'm ordained but I still have to act as an ordained person. I have a ring on my finger but I still must act, everyday, as a husband. Yes, I claim Jesus as Lord, but I still must prove his commands with my life. Thus we start with the end of the story.

Online Read: Matthew 28:16-20 (CEB)

This is literally the end of Matthew's Gospel. What do we find here? When it says that **they worshipped him and some doubted**, I LOVE that! I mean, that's OUR starting place! Those folks standing there, with Jesus before them, could've been us. There ARE us.

But pay attention to the movements in this passage. It's so few words and they come so fast that it can be easy to miss. It says Jesus came near and spoke to them. Not the other way around. If we think we're the ones moving towards God we're already behind. If we're waiting on God we're backing up: God's waiting on us. The idea of being a disciple didn't start with us. It started with God. It is so important that we keep this simple truth in front us. This path, this faith, started with God, not us. If possession is 9/10 of the law, then God OWNS this faith: all the questions, the doubts, the struggles, the needs, the victories, the failures belong to God.

And as if to press the point further, Jesus talks about **authority**.

"I have a problem with authority...Nobody does what I tell them..." (no, not that kind)

Thinking of changing my name to Authorized Personnel Imagine the places I could go with a name like that...(not that kind either)

This radio conversation was released by the Chief of Naval Operations on 10-10-95.

Americans: "Please divert your course 15 degrees to the North to avoid a collision."

Canadians: "Recommend you divert YOUR course 15 degrees to the South to avoid a collision."

Americans: "This is the captain of a US Navy ship. I say again, divert YOUR course."

Canadians: "No, I say again, you divert YOUR course."

Americans: "THIS IS THE AIRCRAFT CARRIER USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN, THE SECOND LARGEST SHIP IN THE UNITED STATES' ATLANTIC FLEET. WE ARE ACCOMPANIED BY THREE DESTROYERS, THREE CRUISERS AND NUMEROUS SUPPORT VESSELS. I DEMAND THAT YOU CHANGE YOUR COURSE 15 DEGREES NORTH. THAT'S ONE-FIVE DEGREES NORTH, OR COUNTER MEASURES WILL BE UNDERTAKEN TO ENSURE THE SAFETY OF THIS SHIP."

Canadians: "This is a lighthouse. Your call." (okay, definitely not that kind)

The kind of authority Jesus is invoking spans history and existence. Jesus is drawing on the authority that spoke Creation to be and parted Red Sea waters. The kind of authority that can fashion an entire dynasty from an immigrant woman. The kind of authority that send someone like Jesus in the first place. It is by this authority Jesus levels the job description of the ages. He gives what is known as the Great Commission:

Make disciples of all nations.

To walk through it, what do we already know about making things? We know there's a difference between instant stuff and crafted stuff. We know that made things take time. Made things take good ingredients. Made things take experimentation and risk-taking. Made things take practice. No comes to the pottery wheel a master potter. They apprentice until they get the hang of it and then practice some more, everyday. **It takes time to make anything** worth while.

Why would that NOT be true of making disciples? This critical mass part of being Christian takes time. We must take time to get to know each other, to hear another's story. We need to take time for each other's struggles. We need to take time to understand. We need to practice talking about our faith and considering the faith of others. We need to take time with God and the faith Jesus' life teaches us to lead. We need to expect the task of being and making disciples to take a life-time.

If you're like me, you grew up in a tradition that highlights the moment of profession of faith. Believe me, there's a place for that. But the task of being Christian is well beyond a profession. It is a life. It takes time to live a life.

But in an age of t-shirts, bumperstickers, hats and yard signs, **how do we best summarize the life of a disciple?** How do we boil down the life of faith to something we can really get our minds around? The stakes are huge. What mountains must we climb or motto to be adopted? What task must we accomplish to know we're on the right track? Jesus did exactly that after serving up the Last Supper and sending Judas on his way to affect his plan. Knowing the cross was coming the next day, that the mock trial was coming that night, that his disciples would soon ditch him at the first sign of trouble, that Peter himself would deny him three times, Jesus told them all: **"This is how everyone will know that you are my disciples, when you love each other."**

Whew. Love each other. That sounds simple enough. We certainly say and affirm it a LOT. I've definitely seen that on t-shirts, bumperstickers, hats and yard signs. I've heard it in song after song after song. And let's be honest: the Bible talks about it a LOT also. We even get it from the Old Testament: "Love God and love people." Love, love, love.

But even after meeting our request for simplicity we still don't seem to be getting the message. Seriously, there's so much going on in the world that can hardly be called love. Genocide, in all its forms, is not love. Poverty is not love. Slavery is not love. Violence is not love. Gossip and rumor mongering is not love. Greed is not love. And if the Great Commission is any indication, not taking time with each other is not love.

Okay. So what is? How can we tell if what we're doing is love and not just something we're *calling* love?

Online Read: 1 Thessalonians 5:12-24 (CEB)

It's quite the list. In fact, if you were to take any of the directives from this list in turn, each of them alone would take a lifetime to master. As it is, God seems to believe we can multitask.

Take the command, "Help the weak." Just think for a moment what that really takes to do well. First, you must grow strong. Then you have identify who is weak. You have to gain their trust and then convince them that you can help. They have to believe you really want to help. Then you have to actually help them. Rinse and repeat. What does all of that require? Love: intimacy and time.

What about **"Pray continually"**? You've got to learn how to pray, in all its forms. You have to work out how to talk with God, how to listen to God, how to anticipate how God thinks. Praying must become so much a part of your life that it becomes background activity, like breathing. What does that require? **Love: intimacy and time with God.**

Hmm...l'm starting to see a pattern.

Making disciples, BEING a disciple, requires intimacy and time. Being a disciple means living that kind of life. As you contemplate that this season of Lent, be warned: this path is for everyone. The excuse that you don't know enough or you're not strong enough or aren't brave enough or that you have doubts or that you are young or old, rich or poor, or only human, none of that flies. Building disciples is *everyone's* responsibility. Being a disciple is everyone's call.

So take your pick from the list. Get started. Get living. And whatever you do, take your time. You have a lifetime to get it right. By the way, don't forget, Jesus "will be with you every day until the end of this present age."

May it be so, amen.

Changing the World

One of the express goals of God's Kingdombuilding is to change the world. And it's not just to get things back to *factory settings*, their original working order. If the Book of Revelation is any guide, we're shooting for something new–albeit, recognizable, but new.

And trying to take in everything that's going on, it all feels too big, overwhelming. Food/water insecurity is a scourge and a by-product of human greed. Food/water insecurity should *not* exist: because there's more than enough to go around. But how do we really end hunger? Political strife has been with us since the Garden and political violence since the first children even though God provided everything they needed. Political strife and violence should not exist. But how do we address politics in real ways and in ways consistent with God's will? Our human habits can be bad to just plain evil: isolation, envy, lust, selfishness, willfulness, stubbornness. We aren't just bulls in the china shop, we sometimes knock down the entire block of stores.

As I watched the meeting in the oval office between our President and others and the President of Ukraine, I found myself realizing in the exchange a shift in our world politics. My heart was full of questions about what comes next and whether anything I do really has any impact. Whether my *faith* really matters.

I believe that may at least be part of why someone asked me if these are the "End Times." They asked whether the players, even President Trump himself, might be the AntiChrist or harbingers of the Apocalypse. Whether the events in the Middle East, especially with Israel, are signaling the end of history as we know it. With all due respect to my colleagues and theologians in many parts of the world (and history), Jesus' very plain command is helpful: be ready.

It's not that the questions don't matter. Of course they do. But what matters more is what we're studying this season of Lent: the life of a *disciple*. What matters is that we are trying to live that disciple-kind of life. If we're doing that, y'all, it simply doesn't matter WHEN the Apocalypse happens: we'll be ready. What can we really know about the End Times? Nothing. No one knows, *Jesus* says. What we DO know is that the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand. It's here. It's now.

So how do I answer the problem of world hunger? I feed whom I can. How do I deal with the politics of my day? I act in my capacity as a citizen: serve where I can, speak up when necessary and love my neighbors. I address the ills of this world by making *shalom*–everything being set right–my personal mission. All of this in service to changing the world by paying attention to the one thing I truly can change: myself. God is changing me. And as that transformation happens, the world changes: what I see, what I hear, what I feel, what I know, what I do.

And so, this season of Lent and beyond, allow God to change the world by making room for God to truly change *you*. Open yourself, really open yourself, to the idea that there is room for improvement in you, places for growth. Then improve. Then grow. Don't just talk about it. Don't just give up chocolate or social media for a few weeks. Give up whatever is holding you back from a disciple's life and embrace the very grace of God that is transforming you.
