A Brief History of Our Church

Hawfields Presbyterian Church was founded by settlers in 1755. The present sanctuary, constructed in 1854, occupies one of three sites used by the congregation over the years. An Educational Building, Fellowship Hall, and century-old Session House also occupy the grounds. The journey for our church includes every transition our country has seen since before we were a country. We've seen the Revolutionary War, the Civil War, the end of slavery, the introduction of co-ed worship space, the move from farming to manufacturing to an Internet-driven economy. We started and have maintained an evening Contemporary Worship Service. The Pandemic was a major, worldwide milestone in which we actually thrived, spurring the start of our online, Home Worship Service. Over the years we founded and shared space with the Presbyterian Home of Hawfields (now Compass Health and Rehabilitation) and the Hawfields Childcare and Development Center. The Hawfields

Civitans run ballparks and many other programs for the community on church grounds behind the main complex. Now, as we contemplate even more changes to our community, it's anyone's guess as to what God has in store for the next 200 years. What we do know is that we will never be the same.

Reading of Scripture

Sermon: "A Song for the Ages"

The lights dimmed. The audience hushed. And then a voice cried out in song like an ancient power calling everything into motion. The "sun" rose on the stage. The animals gathered from each corner of the theater, even the balcony. As the chorus and instruments, especially the drums, added to the sound, Pride Rock comes into view. The King and Queen ascend with the baby prince,

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Simba. Rafiki comes, anoints the prince and raises him up before the kingdom. The music is soaring, taking our emotions and imaginations with it.

When I saw "The Lion King" in Cincinnati with my family, I was not exactly a big Broadway person. I had been in my share of plays and musicals but I just didn't watch them a lot at all nor listen to the soundtracks. Mandy taught me to do that. But sitting there in the theater watching everything unfold, it was breathtaking. For all of my interest in science fiction and special effects, I simply had not experienced anything like that before.

And the simple reality is that without the music the entire experience would have been a dud. Oh, take nothing away from the elaborate costumes, the puppetry, the scenes, or the actors, the lighting, the script, the direction, the stage hands, even the stage itself. The music is what takes the entire experience and makes it burn into the memory and become a spiritual phenomenon.

When I think about my most memorable moments growing up in church, music is at the center of a LOT of those memories. Just hearing a song can take me back to a place welcome and familiar and kinder than the times to which I feel hostage. Music can be an escape. But it is also a bridge. It helps me tie one moment to another and lend strength to my resolve. Music reminds me of home.

I'll never forget one of our members, after suffering a debilitating stroke that left them speechless, somehow found the voice to sing "Amazing Grace." We just hosted the service at Compass Rehabilitation. Where some of those folks can't recall Scripture passages or even hold the songbook in their hands, when the songs rise, their voices rise with them.

What are we to make a gift so powerful? Why did God give us songs to sing?

Well, to answer that, we need to talk about the times we don't feel like singing.

Psalm 137 is beautifully set in the context of the Exile, when the people of God were ripped from

their homes and made to live in foreign territory. They sing,

Alongside Babylon's streams, there we sat down, crying because we remembered Zion. We hung our lyres up in the trees there because that's where our captors asked us to sing; our tormentors requested songs of joy: "Sing us a song about Zion!" they said. But how could we possibly sing the LORD's song on foreign soil?

It's a great question. When I'm trying to grieve my loved ones being gone, when I'm trying to recover from surgery, when I'm overwhelmed by the changes in my culture, my community, the changes in myself, when I'm baffled by the cruelty and evil I experience, when I get to the point that just sitting at home and staying away from it all seems like the better option, how do I sing? How do we say "Praise God" when everything in our life seems to point at God having abandoned us?

In the letter to the Colossians, we are told the reason. We are told how to leverage the power music can have over human life, even in misery.

Read: Colossians 3:12-17 (CEB) Song is the garment of our faith.

So, we don't sing only when we *feel* like it. There's was nothing in there about conditions, circumstances, or even formulas. We put on faith like a garment. Determine to be we are meant to be. The peace of Christ must control our hearts, not fear. We *choose* to do all of that. And we sing, y'all, to learn how.

That congregation member who sang "Amazing Grace" with us even after he stroke, found her voice. There are days that music can reach me when nothing else does. On a recent vacation with my family, there was a run where we heard a bunch of music from the 80s. My wife and I gave each other knowing looks as we were taken back to times, to moments, that formed us. One of the reasons church leaders in the Middle Ages stole pop tunes and replaced the words was to tap into

something that we all know. Some of the most wellloved hymns we sing borrowed their tunes from pubs in small European towns. Can you think of a better way to teach theology than to put the concepts to music?

Father Abraham had many sons Many sons had Father Abraham I am one of them, and so are you So let's just praise the Lord...

We could drill down into the finer points of Genesis 15:5:

Then he brought Abram outside and said, "Look up at the sky and count the stars if you think you can count them." He continued, "This is how many children you will have."

Yet we have a song that spells out plainly the implications of this divine promise and our part in it. "I am one of them and so are you" is about as loaded a theological statement as you can find. The implications are powerful and generational.

We can sing "Count Your Blessings" or "Every Time I Feel the Spirit" or "When the Roll Is Called up Yonder" or "Precious Lord" or "Here I Am, Lord" or any number of hymns, songs, choruses, that don't simply speak to when we learned the song but to what the song makes us feel, what it makes us remember, what it teaches us anew about God and each other, what the song does to buoy our faith. And of course, WHO the songs make us remember.

As I talk with people about the church songs that stand out to them, I wonder what songs might have been raised up by our forebears. What would have the founders preferred? What would the families have sung? What held weight with our children, our slaves, our visitors, our people, over this 270 years? And what do those songs teach us about who they were, what their values were, what they were facing? What do our songs teach people about us: who we are, what our values are, what we are facing now?

But Colossians is clear: our songs are about more than circumstance or even history. They are prayers, our prayers, that help us connect and reconnect to a living God. This invariably draws us back to a basic task.

Online Read: Psalm 150 (CEB) Praise God everywhere with everything!

One of the goofy things about how we practice worship nowadays is we get hung up on appropriateness: everything in its place and a place for everything. Now, as a classically-trained seminarian, believe me, I'm all about things being done "right." Use the right language, use the right songs, follow the right procedures. How do you even recognize if you're worshipping God without this kind of structure?

But then God answers us simply and comprehensively.

We get clues to this in something Jesus says to the woman at the well:

"But the time is coming–and is here!–when true worshippers will worship in spirit and truth. The Father looks for those who worship him this way. God is spirit, and it is necessary to worship God in spirit and truth." (John 4:23-24)

Okay, fine. Spirit and truth. But what does that really mean? How do we get there? Well remember, Colossians said the songs will get us there. The music will teach us how. So what does the say to do?

Praise the Lord!

Honestly, Psalm 150 could've just stopped there and have been done. But the rest of the Psalm just tries to explain the scope and stakes.

First, Praise God everywhere. How do I know it says "everywhere"? Well, let's go through it. Where in Creation can you go that God is not present? Where on this earth can you go where God is NOT active? So...everywhere.

Second point: Praise God with everything. It is telling to me that all the things the Psalm says to praise God with have to do with music: makeshift instruments, crafted instruments, drums and dancing (seriously, when's the last time you danced before God?...you really should!). And cymbals: glorious, bracing, lingering. Everything in the band's arsenal. Oh, and, just to be sure we get the point, the song says, "every living thing." Take a moment and make your list: every living thing. How long until you give up and just say, "Okay, all of Creation"? That's everything.

Praise the Lord!

It's life itself. All of life that should be singing. God, y'all, expects our lives to sing. And so on the occasion of 270 years of being a congregation, let us keep singing.

We are in the season of Easter. In that time of the year that we celebrate the power of God to raise up a Church despite our best efforts to do otherwise. It's not about longevity. It's about the compelling authority of God to write the music of the present and the future together in us, standing on the shoulders of all that came before us.

Christ is risen! The Lord is risen indeed! Hallelujah!
