"Gatekeeping the Blessings"


The thing standing in the way of true blessings from God is often ourselves.

(online only) Preparation for Worship

Gather these items for worship. If an items unavailable, fret not:

- a piece of white cloth
- an end table or stand
- a plate
- a cup
- · a glass or bowl
- · a lighter/match

- a padlock and key (or combination lock)
- a computer or internetaccessible device
- a thank you card to God for something this week



For each item you have, thank God for the provision. For each piece you do not have, thank God you don't need it. Place the table/stand in the area you plan to worship. If more than one person will be present, place the table in the middle of where you will be seated. Drape the cloth over it. Arrange the cup, plate, glass of water, and other items on the table. Keep the Bible in front of you. Have enough elements for each person in your household.

Questions for the announcement loop

In preparing for Worship, consider the following:

- What does it take to convince you to make changes in your life?
- Who is allowed to make changes in your life?
- If you're not hurting anyone or bothering anybody, why should you change anything?
- What do you imagine is something God wants you to change about your life *today*?

Prayer of Confession/Preparation

We come to God so often looking for help, looking for inspiration, looking for resources. And we should! But we often fail to ask God what we should actually DO with the help, inspiration and resources we're given. It's not good that we do that. It's important to talk about our shortcomings so that we're ready to hear what God has to say. Let us begin with silent prayer...

Reading of Scripture

Say: When the temptation and tendency to overcomplicate God's will overtakes us, God's Word is given, accessible and ready. By God's Spirit, it can light up even the darkest recesses of our hearts and minds and show us something new. Let us be open to this gift of God and ask for help to understand. Let us pray...(everyone sings)

Our Scripture lesson comes to us from the Gospel according to Luke, chapter 16, verses 19-31. Listen closely to the Word of God to us all and to our ongoing place in God's story...

Read: Luke 16:19-31 (CEB)

Parable of the Rich Man and Lazarus.

¹⁹ "There was a certain rich man who clothed himself in purple and fine linen, and who feasted luxuriously every day. ²⁰ At his gate lay a certain poor man named Lazarus who was covered with sores. ²¹ Lazarus longed to eat the crumbs that fell from the rich man's table. Instead, dogs would come and lick his sores.

²² "The poor man died and was carried by angels to Abraham's side. The rich man also died and was buried. ²³ While being tormented in the place of the dead, he looked up and saw Abraham at a distance with Lazarus at his side. ²⁴ He shouted, 'Father Abraham, have mercy on me. Send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, because I'm suffering in this flame.' ²⁵ But Abraham said, 'Child, remember that during your lifetime you received good things, whereas Lazarus received terrible things. Now Lazarus is being comforted and you are in great pain. ²⁶ Moreover, a great crevasse has been fixed between us and you. Those who wish to cross over from here to you cannot. Neither can anyone cross from there to us.'

²⁷ "The rich man said, 'Then I beg you, Father, send Lazarus to my father's house. ²⁸ I have five brothers. He needs to warn them so that they don't come to this place of agony.' ²⁹ Abraham replied, 'They have Moses and the Prophets. They must listen to them.' ³⁰ The rich man said, 'No, Father Abraham! But if someone from the dead goes to them, they will change their hearts and lives.' ³¹ Abraham said, 'If they don't listen to Moses and the Prophets, then neither will they be persuaded if someone rises from the dead."

Children's Sermon

Adults, you'll need:

- a pie or cake to share (with necessary plates and utensils)
- Don't forget to wait for answers "Enough to Go Around"
- Do you know what this is? Yes! It's a pie! And what are you supposed to do with a pie? Well, eat it, of course. So let's see...there's more pie

here than I can all by myself. In fact, if I DO try to eat it all by myself, I'll make myself sick. What should I do?....

- I know: I'll just cut a slice of it and keep the rest for later. Right? How long do you think I can keep it? A month? A year? I mean, what if I just don't feel like eating pie? So, yes, just cut a piece and keep the rest. But if I keep it too long what happens to the pie?...it spoils!
- Goodness, what should I do? I can't eat it all by myself, but I can't keep it too long or it will spoil. God's thinks that we should definitely cut it into pieces and then SHARE the pie. Actually give pieces to others. Sharing is God's solution to enjoying blessings without spoiling.
- So when you're around the people who care about you, ask them about when they share and why.
- Don't forget to pray!

Sermon: "Gatekeeping the Blessings" The thing standing in the way of true blessings from God is often ourselves.

Not that God needs my endorsement at all, but I really love the way **God tells stories.** We get glimpses of not just heaven, but how things are supposed to work, here and now. And with these stories you glimpses of humanity. Not just humanity as God would *like* us to be, but humanity as we are. We can see ourselves in these stories because God *knows* us. It's perhaps the most comforting thing about God's expectations of us: God has us *completely* in view.

So what is it that God sees in us?

God sees our passions. God sees our desires. God sees what we hide and through the layers of masks we might wear. God sees our failings and failures, our victories and celebrations. God sees who we chose to be, who we are, who we are created to be. There's a concept in psychology called the Johari Window. The idea is that there is the part of us we reveal to folks. Then there's the part we hide from folks. There's the part of us that people see that we

can't see for ourselves. And then there's the part of us that no one can see, not ourselves, not others, without help. Yet God can see it all.

So when God tells the story of the Rich Man and Lazarus, it is with all of us fully in view.

Read: Luke 16:19-31 (CEB) Parable of the Rich Man and Lazarus.

It's the flourishes that really sell it. Understanding the visual cues Jesus employs to really paint the picture. **Purple, the color of royalty,** the status symbol in cloth, showing the true wealth of a person. And he doesn't just eat everyday, **he feasts "luxuriously"**. All of that in contrast to a man who was so poor, hungry and sick **that dogs had pity** on him.

Thing is, this contrast wouldn't have been out of reach for Jesus' hearers. They saw this kind of social/economic disparity everyday. Most prominently among their own leadership. Just like now, clothes separated the rich from poor, the powerful from the powerless. The ability to eat when and how you want dividing the wealthy from those who simply were not.

These signs aren't new. We make judgements, moral judgements, on people to this day based on these things. Being poor is considered a condition, like having palsy or smallpox: something to be avoided, corrected, despised. By the same token we see wealth as confirmation, affirmation of the one possessing it. We even ascribe intelligence, moral stature, even virtue to those who know how to exact and possess wealth. This has been going on since the beginning. Even though God provided all they possessed, Cain killed his brother out of jealousy. Possessions, or the lack thereof, become this weird, universally-accepted barometer for sizing a person up, for determining worth.

Until faced with our mortality.

While the picture painted in the parable of the hereafter is inexact, imprecise, **the role reversal is unmistakable**. Whatever Lazarus might have suffered in life, he enjoyed sumptuousness beyond

death. The rich man suffered. And, as in life, both men took on these roles in view of each other. Full view of each other.

It makes me wonder if we think at all about the ones we overlook, the ones we ignore in this life. How will we see them later, after? What will we be able to see of each other? When we pass by the one on the exit ramp holding a sign, will we be holding a sign in the hereafter as they pass us by?

But it doesn't stop there. In Jesus' story, the rich man *still* can't be bothered to speak to Lazarus. He *presumes* talking to Abraham. We'll talk about that level of entitlement another time.

But across the gap, the crevasse, there is no longer any opportunity to tend to another's suffering. The opportunity for that is here, now, in *this* life. So the rich man makes his request for his siblings.

It's at this point that the story takes a turn it's taken me a long time to wrap my mind around. I've read commentaries that think this is foreshadowing the cross and resurrection. And maybe it is. But I think what's being reflected here is good ol' fashioned human nature.

We already have what we need to understand God's will and plan for our lives, Jesus suggests.

Sure. Sure. But if someone came back from the dead, then we would REALLY believe and live our lives the way God wants.

Yet God contends: we will NOT be persuaded, even by someone coming back from the dead.

If you're like me, you've had to wonder: how is that possible?

The reason is really not all that complicated or strange. **We get in our own way.**

Let's walk through it.

How do we determine ownership? How do we know if someone owns anything in our society, our culture? A deed? A contract? Our name or social

security number on an account somewhere? A receipt? An unspoken or verbal agreement? I think about the folks in the Western North Carolina for whom mudslides and swollen water ways changed how they thought about property. I think about the folks on what was the coast of Indonesia having to change their maps because the tsunami had other ideas. I think about folks in Japan, in California, in Afghanistan for whom earthquakes left them with shaken foundations believed to be settled. Before the Exile, the Israelites thought of the Promised Land as a certain thing, like gravity or air, just being there, available. The disciples couldn't conceive of the warning Jesus was trying to give them in advance of the crucifixion. The Romans thought they would be in power forever. The King of England thought he owned the colonies. I'm sure the Native Americans who established their burial grounds never imagined Buc-ee's would be sitting on top of them. Still trying to wrap my head around what NCDOT told us: Highway 119 will widen and they will take up a part of our cemetery to do it. All of this to say that possession is a fluid thing when it comes to us as human beings.

But for God, well, it **ALL belongs to God.** And so what we have, all that we might claim to possess, even our abilities, are on loan to us from God. The mistake that the rich man made, that we make, is that he actually thought his wealth belonged to him. He forgot that sharing what he had with Lazarus was a part of his responsibilities, not his privilege. That he wasn't destined to be a blessing bucket. He supposed to be a fountain that God resupplied.

There is a church in Kentucky that has a sizable endowment. The mission of the endowment is "to empower and support ministry projects not ordinarily covered by the church budget." But the governing board of the endowment saw instead that their mission was to "protect and grow the endowment," something not found anywhere in the endowment's charter. So, they ended up saying "No" a lot. One of the board members talked the rest into investing the endowment into several funds profiting from the housing bubble in 2007. A few years later and they were no longer in the position to say "Yes", even if they wanted to.

The mistake we make-and, y'all, not just with money, with everything: our physical spaces, our food, our families, our friends, love, hope, even forgiveness-is that we think we are the gatekeepers of the blessings we receive from God's hand. We think that God's grace and goodness and love and abundance needs protecting and preserving. The lessons of Manna get by us.

Hungry, starving even, in the middle of the desert, the people railed against Moses and complained against God. God rained Manna on them and provided quails. The rule, though, was to collect only what was needed for the day or it would spoil. But on the day before the Sabbath, they needed to collect twice as much (as it happens, that batch didn't spoil after a day). Do you know what people did? Some of them tried to save Manna their way anyway. For some reason, we have a hard time allowing God to be in control. Allowing GOD to be the true gatekeeper. When we try to stockpile, cache, or otherwise hedge with God's blessings, we tell God "thanks for the provision, but we don't trust you to give us anymore." It's a demonstration of a lack of faith in the face of God's present ahundance

When all the talk about the rapture supposedly happening this past Tuesday (in case you missed it) ensued, I couldn't help but marvel at how illinformed some of our siblings in Christ were behaving. First, there was the talk of who gets to go, who would be taken. Then there was the talk about getting ready, even to the point of selling cars and homes (although, what are you supposed to do with the cash in heaven?). Of course, there was the talk about the date and time itself and all the signs pointing to the moment. But in all of this naked effort to try and wrest control from God, no one considered that God had a handle on heaven already. We just needed to focus on being heavenly people. It just doesn't matter when it happens if we're made ready by the way we live our lives.

You see, neither the rich man nor Lazarus could know when their time was coming. It simply came for both of them. Where they landed was a choice made FOR them. The gap, the crevasse was imposed between them. The banquet table and the fire was set up without their consent. The choice before them was how they chose to live their lives before they died. Someday, maybe we as a humanity will really get this. Maybe we will fulfill and live out what we were made to be. The thing standing in the way of true blessings from God is often ourselves. Stop gatekeeping. We need to stop taking it upon ourselves to decide who is deserving of God's blessings. We need to stop worrying about who's going to be occupying God's heaven. We need to put our energy not into receiving blessings (like the televangelists tell us) and focus on actually being blessings. The rich man missed his opportunity. My family, let us be sure not to miss ours.

My family in Christ, may it be so. Amen.
