

Nature's Calendar for Easter

In the past, plants were more important for people in charting the passing year than they are now. Many flowers have names that link their flowering time to that of the church calendar with several associated with Eastertide.

Greater stitchwort (*Stellaria holostea*) was also known as Easter Bell and Good Friday Grass is still a commonly used name for Field Wood-rush (*Luzula campestris*). Good Friday Grass is a frequent component of churchyard grassland, particularly in places with either acid or lime-rich soils. It's brush-like flowers are quite subtle but always appear in time for Easter. Another name for it is Sweep's Broom due to the shape of the flowers.

Another small but beautiful plant to look out for at this time of year is Wood Sorrel (*Oxalis acetosella*) which has several names including Cuckoo's Bread and Cheese, Granny's Sour Grass and Alleluia as its delicate white flowers appear between Easter and Whitsun, and its trefoil, shamrock-shaped leaves bring associations with the Holy Trinity.

Pasqueflower (*Pulsatilla vulgaris*) also blooms at Easter time, the name Pasque meaning 'of Easter'. It is now rare in the wild, found in a few places where there is ancient, undisturbed grassland on limestone. It is often associated with old earthworks such as barrows, hillforts and boundary banks and there was a legend that it grew where the blood of Danes or Romans had been spilt. *

It's not only flowers that chart the passing months and the Christian calendar. St Mark's Fly (*Bibio marci*) is a long, black, shiny fly which hatches around St Mark's Day, April 25th. Large numbers of flies can be found in woodland edges, hedgerows and fields often mating in mid-air giving them the alternate name of Love Bug! They fly rather aimlessly with dangling legs, usually surviving as adults for about one week and getting eaten in large numbers, providing a ready food source. They are also an important pollinator of early flowering trees such as many fruit trees.

As you watch the spring unfurling, spare a thought for our ancestors who used nature as a calendar and lived much closer to a profusion of plants and animals than we do now. Perhaps this could be an inspiration to get involved in nature recovery in our much-depleted land.

APRIL BULLETIN

Staffordshire Moorlands District Council will cease to exist by April 2028 as part of the Government's plans to reorganise local government.



Last December the Government published the English Devolution White Paper which set out its plans to widen and deepen devolution across England. It also outlined how the Government will reform local government, as the foundation for devolution.

Devolution is the transfer of functions and powers to regions governed by Strategic Authorities (Combined Authorities) to ensure that the whole of England benefits. Staffordshire has not taken part in the devolution process so far.

Devolution and local government reorganisation are separate issues but are closely linked. In February, the Minister of State wrote to the Leaders of Staffordshire County Council, all district and borough councils and Stoke-on-Trent City Council formally inviting them to develop a proposal for local government reorganisation for the area.

Staffordshire County Councillors have backed draft proposals for a new unitary authority to oversee services for residents.

The county's eight district and borough councils, which currently provide services such as bin collections, emergency housing, planning and leisure facilities, are all facing the axe as part of national government plans to reorganise the local authority system.

Stoke-on-Trent City Council has proposed the creation of a North Staffordshire authority, covering Newcastle Borough and Staffordshire Moorlands District alongside Stoke-on Trent.

As a continuation of handing more power back to residents there is a controversial proposal in the Moorlands to give Parish Councils more local powers by creating village Mayors.

Powers of a Village Mayor would include granting planning for housing, new road surfacing, financial benefits for chosen residents, compulsory discounts in local supermarkets to name just a few.

There would have to be a village referendum held, to choose a Mayor, or it could be worked on a yearly basis on residents' surnames in alphabetical order.

- * Chair Pilates is a great way to exercise without getting up and down off the floor. It's good for building arm and leg strength, flexibility and joint mobility. The class is low impact and could be useful if you have arthritis, back pain or poor balance.
- * Mat Pilates is a strengthening and lengthening form of exercise that focuses on your core muscles while also training the arms and legs. The results include improved posture, better coordination, stress management and injury prevention. All of the exercises in this class can be modified to decrease or increase the level of challenge.
- * Intense Pilates is also mat-based; however, it often includes weights and other equipment to increase the difficulty and also increase the challenge.
- * Private tuition 1:1 or small group sessions are also available with Louise if you have a specific issue or rehabilitation requirement.

If you have identified an issue on a public road, please report it to the appropriate authority using the links below. The more people that report an issue, the sooner it is likely to be resolved. If you report an issue and find it remains unresolved months later, you are welcome to contact Alstonefield Parish Council, by either attending a meeting or contacting the clerk. Details on the Parish Council pages of the Alstonefield village website.

Potholes and other road defects can be reported online on the Staffordshire County Council website at https://formshighways.staffordshire.gov.uk/homepage/9/report-a-pothole-or-road-condition. When submitting a report, it is important to include photographs and a description of the location to ensure that the highways team can identify what you have reported. If you can use the "What3Words" App - What3Words.com, this can help the council teams find the pothole quickly.
