

But to put things in perspective it helps to know how the County relates to the State as a whole. According to the United States Census July 1, 2024 report, the state of Kansas has a population of 2,970,606; which includes 35,737 residents of Miami County.

The numbers above, as far as I'm concerned, are staggering considering that DOGE never disclosed conclusive findings of fraud and waste within Medicaid or any other service. And the loss of healthcare and food subsidies are only a small portion of the negative impact made by this administration. The impacts of tariffs on small business owners who rely on raw materials and products from outside the U.S. and ICE raids on immigrants that support our farmers will be devastating over the coming years.

According to a story reported on July 9, 2025 by Congressional Correspondent Lisa Desjardins on PBS 60% of the BBB is attributed to tax cuts while adding approximately 4 trillion dollars to our national debt. You may

benefit from the bill if you: earn over \$50,000 in a high tax state, are a farmer receiving subsidies or, are a recipient of an estate. You won't fare so well if you earn less than \$18,000, work in the solar or wind industries, or are in your 50's or 60's and are on Medicaid or receive SNAP. A lot of the tax cuts stop after the 2026 elections, creating an opportunity to blame the ill effects on whomever is elected into office.

The loss of income generated tax revenues over the next 10 years are astounding. If you're looking for a holiday or birthday gift, the \$200 tax applicable to the sale of gun silencers has been eliminated. Yes, you read that right! You know, just like in the movies, the metal attachment that can be add to a gun so a shot can't be heard. The **loss** of incoming tax revenue from silencers alone is estimated at \$1.7 billion. Yes, that's billion with a B – and that's a lot of silencers. While incoming tax revenues allocations will include, and are not limited to, \$200 million to the Kennedy Center, \$85 million for the expense of moving space shuttles, and \$40 million to build the Garden of Heroes (a selection of statues created to depict different Americans identified by President Trump).



In the meantime, the President has ordered that funding allocated for education that was previously approved by Congress to be withheld from distribution to states across the country. The table below explains the impact to school districts in Miami County. The Paola school district will be discussing the district's budget and short comings at the BOE meeting on August 11th. Check with your local district for additional information.
