Important Travel Information: Flying with Portable Oxygen Concentrators (POCs)

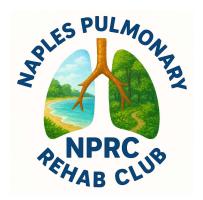
As many of us enjoy traveling, especially during peak seasons, we want to provide essential information for members who fly with a Portable Oxygen Concentrator (POC).

Traveling with a POC requires adherence to specific FAA (Federal Aviation Administration) regulations and individual airline policies. Planning ahead is key to a stress-free journey!

Key Requirements Checklist for POC Travel

Please use this checklist well in advance of your flight:

- I. Pre-Flight Preparation (Start 1-2 Weeks Before Travel)
  - 1. Airline Notification: Contact your airline immediately (most require at least 48 hours notice) to inform them you will be traveling with and/or using a POC. They will likely require a specific form to be filled out.
  - 2. Physician's Statement: Obtain a completed form or statement from your doctor certifying:
    - Your medical necessity for the POC.
    - The specific required flow rate or liter per minute (LPM) setting.



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- Your ability to understand and respond to the device's alarms.
- 3. FAA-Approved Model Check: Ensure your specific POC model is on the FAA's approved list. Most modern devices have a certification label on the exterior.
- 4. Battery Calculation (Crucial!): You must carry enough fully charged batteries to power the POC for a minimum of 150% of the maximum expected flight duration. Airlines generally do not guarantee in-seat power.

### II. Battery Safety and Packaging

- Spare Batteries MUST be in Carry-on Bags ONLY. Lithium batteries are strictly prohibited in checked luggage.
- Protect Terminals: To prevent short circuits, individually protect all spare batteries
  by taping over the terminals, placing them in their original packaging, or using a
  separate protective pouch or plastic bag for each.

### III. Day of Travel and In-Flight Rules

- Arrive Early: Be prepared to meet with an airline agent at check-in to verify your documentation and device.
- Seat Restrictions: You cannot sit in an emergency exit row. You may be required to sit in a window seat to ensure the tubing does not obstruct the aisle.
- Stowage: The POC must be safely stowed during taxi, takeoff, and landing, typically under the seat in front of you.



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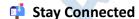
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 Unobstructed Operation: Ensure the air intake vents are clear at all times during use to prevent overheating.

Disclaimer: These are general guidelines. Always contact your specific airline before booking and again before departure to confirm their exact policy, forms, and aircraft-specific restrictions.
