### Rain, Resilience & Ruthless Performances

The 6th Edition of the PLOW League officially teed off at Peace Park, Kyambogo University under light morning showers. While the rain attempted to delay the excitement, our players had other plans.

The showers came.

The players braved them.

The competition went on.

A total of 50 players turned up and were distributed as follows:

- Men Seniors: 23
- Women Seniors: 12
- Men Corporates: 8
- Women Corporates: 3
- Doubles Only Players: 4

18 pairs registered to compete in the doubles category, promising serious fireworks in the team competition this season.



### SENIOR MEN: THE IRON FIST RETURNS

The two-time defending champion, Gwaaka Brian, wasted no time reminding the league why he sits on the throne.

With a commanding 137 strokes, he stormed into 1st place going into Outing 2. His performance can only be described as a warning shot to the rest of the field:

“First place is occupied. Kindly compete for the remaining positions.”

Close behind him, in what many described as a surprising but impressive display, League President Ariho Isaac secured 2nd place with 153 strokes, while Byamukama Bridge followed closely in 3rd with 156 strokes.

The big question now is —

Will anyone dare challenge Brian for the throne this season, or should the rest simply negotiate for second place?

## **SENIOR WOMEN: THE QUEEN HOLDS COURT**

In the Senior Women’s category, the three-time defending champion Babirye continued her routine dominance, claiming victory in the first outing with 165 strokes.

However, the emergence of two first-timers — Nagudi Shakirah and Atim Eunice — both posting 175 strokes, signals that the competition may not remain comfortable for long.

Will the Queen extend her dynasty into a fourth year?

Or is a new challenger preparing a silent rebellion?

## **CORPORATE CATEGORY: EXPERIENCE VS RETURN**

Among the men corporates, Masiga Jackson, the 2024 winner, claimed first place with an impressive 121 strokes in 24 gates, narrowly edging out the returning Kiiza Caleb, who followed closely with 122 strokes.

In the women corporates category, Namubiru Aidah emerged victorious with 130 strokes, defeating last season’s winner Nassuna Teddy, who finished second with 135 strokes.

The corporates have clearly come prepared this season — no friendly networking, just serious competition.

## **DOUBLES: THE BATTLE OF NAMESAKES**

While some doubles pairs came to participate... two pairs of namesakes came to dominate.

In what can only be described as a “League of Extraordinary Isaacs,” the on-form League President Ariho Isaac teamed up with his namesake Nabugere Isaac, and the duo stormed to the top of the leaderboard with 99 strokes in 24 gates.

But the Isaacs were not alone.

In a dramatic twist, another pair of namesakes — Munyendo Joel and Lipa Joel, matched that exact score of 99 strokes, tying at the top and officially turning the doubles competition into a battle of names.

At this rate, we may soon require players to bring national IDs to confirm which Joel or Isaac we are awarding. 😊

Not to be overshadowed, the steady pair of Ssenteza Aloysious and Babirye Noeline secured third place with 104 strokes, setting the tone for what promises to be a fiercely contested doubles season.

With four more outings still to go, the question remains:

Will the namesakes maintain their dominance?

Or will new combinations rise and rewrite the script?

Energy levels are high.

Partnership chemistry is building.

The 6th Edition doubles competition has officially begun — and it is already personal.
