# UNDERSTANDING LENSES: A VISUAL GUIDE FOR photographers

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## WHY LENSES MATTER

Your lens controls more than just how close you can get to your subject. It affects the mood, depth, perspective, and even how people look in your images.

In this guide, you'll learn how to confidently choose the right lens for your vision.

### WHAT IS FOCAL LENGTH?

Focal length (measured in mm) describes how zoomed-in or wide your image appears.

 Shorter focal lengths (14–35mm) = wider field of view

 Longer focal lengths (85–200mm+) = more zoom + compression

Focal length also changes background blur, distortion, and how your subject appears. 3

## PRIME VS ZOOM LENSES

Prime Lenses:

- Fixed focal length (e.g., 35mm, 85mm)
- Typically sharper, wider apertures (e.g., f/1.8, f/1.4)
- Great for portraits, low light, and creative control

Zoom Lenses:

- Range of focal lengths (e.g., 24–70mm)
- More flexible, less need to move
- Useful for events, travel, unpredictable situations

<u>**Tip:</u>** If you're just starting out, a 50mm prime is a game-changer.</u>

### WHAT IS LENSE COMPRESSION?

Compression is how a lens flattens or stretches the space between subjects and background.

- Wide lenses (24mm) exaggerate space, making objects look farther apart
- Telephoto lenses (135mm+) compress space, bringing background closer
- This can dramatically change the feeling of a photo from intimate to dramatic.

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#### BEST FOCAL LENGTH FOR PORTRAITS

For flattering faces and soft background blur, use these:

- 50mm Versatile, natural look
- 85mm Soft, compressed background (ideal for portraits)
- 135mm Stunning compression and isolation (for space)

<u>Shoot Type</u>	<u>Focal Length</u>	<u>Notes</u>
Landscapes	14–35mm	Capture wide scenic views
Portraits	50–135mm	Flattering compression
Events	24–70mm or 70–200mm	Versatile zoom range
Products	50mm or 85mm	Detail + depth
Street/Travel	35mm	Candid, wide, compact

## NOT SURE WHERE TO START?

- Want dreamy portraits? → Start with 85mm f/1.8
- Shoot a bit of everything? → Try a 24–70mm f/2.8
- Need something compact and versatile? → Go with 35mm f/1.8
- Budget-conscious beginner? → Grab a 50mm f/1.8 — small, fast, and powerful
