Examples of Plagiarism Violations:

- Using AI to generate text in any part of your thesis.
 - Copy/pasting text or content from external sources and representing it as your own.
 - Using other scholars' data and representing it as your own.
 - Using other scholars' ideas and representing them as your own.
 - Using other scholars' words and representing them as your own.
 - Failing to properly cite sources:
 - Failure to use adequate quotation marks with author/source attribution.
 - Failure to adequately summarize or paraphrase while Failing to include author/source attribution.
 - Absence of in-text citations to attribute sources or ideas.
 - Copy/pasting your own work from previously submitted assignments or published works.
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Acceptable use of AI or computer assistance:

- Spelling and grammar check
 - Thesaurus for individual words
 - Generating tables, figures, or images based on original text written by or data collected and/or analyzed by the author (content is author's) or properly attributed to the originator.
 - Generating in-text citations and/or bibliography from a citation manager (Zotero, Endnote).
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Unacceptable use of AI or computer assistance:

- Generating text (phrases, sentences, paragraphs).
