# **Anonymous/Traditional:** The Wexford Carol Conducted by Caleb Astrati

The Wexford Carol is one of my favourite carols. It is also known as the Enniscorthy Carol and likely dates back to the 15th or 16th century, although some argue that its origins are even older. It was popularised in the 20th century after William Flood transcribed it from local singers at the cathedral in Enniscorthy, Ireland. While the pre-20th Century origins are largely unknown, the 500-year history of this carol connects PCO to a musical legacy, originating in Ireland and living at this time of year across the world.

# **Tchaikovsky:** Lento Lugubre - Manfred Symphony Conducted by Hannah Catherine Jones

Pyotr Ilych Tchaikovsky composed Manfred in 1885 in between Symphonies 4 & 5, but it is rarely performed in comparison to his numbered symphonies due to its length and complexity, requiring a very large orchestra and perhaps due to Tchaikovsky's turbulent relationship with it - at one time claiming it as his best work and later declaring that is should be destroyed, apart from the first movement, which we will perform this evening. It's an intense and dramatic work based on Byron's 1817 poem depicting Manfred - a Faustian nobleman and magician wandering the Alps ruminating life's metaphysical questions of life and death, summoning occult sorcerers to help him to try and forget his incestuous relationship with his half-sister. This theme of anguish within the poem is mirrored in Tchaikovsky's lived torment of having to conceal his homosexuality from the public eye for most of his lifetime. The despair he felt is channelled into all his music, and particularly this work, the first movement of which is titled Lento Lugubre meaning slow and lugubrious, dismal, sorrowful.

#### Yazoo: Only You

# Conducted by Anna Williams & arranged by Claire Taylor

Originally released in 1983 by the synth-pop duo Yazoo, Only You quickly became associated with Christmas when The Flying Pickets released their a cappella cover, reaching Christmas No. 1 in the same year. This orchestral arrangement, beautifully crafted by our cellist Clare Taylor, transforms the piece into an atmospheric ballad, highlighting its haunting yet timeless melody with some glorious glockenspiel moments. The song has remained one of my top played songs for years, and feels especially magical this time of year - perfect for plugging in your headphones and romanticising your life while looking out a bus window on a cold winter's night.

## Glenn Campbell: Wichita Lineman Conducted & arranged by Finn Page

Glen Campbell's Wichita Lineman, a song cherished by many people, is about a man whose job it is to repair and maintain phone lines in the vast plains of the southern USA. I love the orchestral arrangement in the original recording, and since joining PCO I've wondered how it would sound if an orchestra of our size had a go. The original outro, which in my opinion is when the strings just get going, sadly only lasts for four bars before it begins to fade out, whereas it could go on forever as far as I'm concerned. So for the PCO version, I have extended this section and written an alternative ending. Jimmy Webb, who wrote Wichita Lineman, always maintained that the song was given to Campbell unfinished but GC went ahead and recored it anyway, so maybe this is what it was meant to sound like after all. Please enjoy and perhaps, if the mood strikes, sing along.

# The Beatles x Sisqó: Rigby's Thong Conducted & arranged by Hannah C. Jones
