
# BOOK FOUR

### Family and Friends



Family and friends are a big part of our lives. Family members are the people we are related to, such as parents, children, brothers, and sisters. Relatives include extended family members like grandparents, aunts, uncles, and cousins. Friends are people we are not related to, but we enjoy spending time with and trust. Having good relationships with family and friends makes life happier and easier.

In this lesson, you will learn how to talk about family and friends. You will practice using new words to describe your family members and the relationships between them. You will also learn how to ask and answer questions about family and friends in everyday conversations.

Knowing how to talk about family and friends is helpful in many situations. Whether you are introducing a family member, talking about your childhood, or making new friends, these words will help you communicate clearly. The more you practice, the easier it will be to talk about the important people in your life.







Family – A group of people related by blood, marriage, or adoption.

**Relative** – A person in your family.

**Parent** – A father or mother.

**Sibling** – A brother or sister.

Child / Children – A young person or persons; a son or daughter.

**Grandparent** – The father or mother of your parent.

**Spouse** – A husband or wife.

**Twin** – One of two children born at the same time to the same parents.

**Ancestor** – A family member from past generations.

### In-Laws

In-laws are the family members of your spouse, such as your mother-in-law or brother-in-law. This term refers to relatives gained through marriage, not by blood.

#### **Examples**

**Mother-in-law** – Your spouse's mother.

**Daughter-in-law** – Your son's wife

**Sister-in-law** – Your sibling's wife or your spouse's sister.

**Brother-in-law** – Your sibling's husband or your spouse's brother.

### Half and Step

A 'half' is a sibling who shares only one biological parent with you. A 'step' is a family relationship through marriage, not by blood. See examples below.

#### **Examples**

**Half-brother** – A brother who has the same biological father, but different mother.

**Half-sister** – A sister who shares the same biological parent, father or mother.

**Step-mother** – Your father's wife who is not your (biological) mother.

**Step-brother** – The son of your step-parent, not biologically related to you.

### Ex and Great

An 'ex' is a former spouse; an ex-husband or ex-wife. A 'great' refers to a family member of an earlier generation; usually grandparents or grandchildren.

#### Examples

**Ex-wife** – A woman who was once married to someone but is now divorced.

**Ex-husband** – A man who was once married to someone but is now divorced.

**Great-grandmother** – the mother of your grandparent.

Great-grandson – the son of your grandchild.

Great great-Grandfather – A father of your great-grandparents.

### Friends Definitions

**Friend** – A person you like and trust.

**Acquaintance** – Someone you know, but not very well.

**Teammate** – A person who is on the same sports or work team as you.

**Neighbor** – A person who lives near you.

**Colleague** – A person you work with.

**Classmate** – A person who is in the same class as you at school.

**Partner** – A person you work or do activities with.


Boyfriend/Girlfriend – Someone who is in a romantic relationship with you.


### Learning Idioms




"Like father, like son." Meaning: A son often behaves like his father.


Meaning: The person who makes decisions in a relationship or family.
