The Eaton Lab's primary affiliation has moved to the Jane Addams College of Social Work at the University of Illinois Chicago, creating new opportunities for interdisciplinary collaboration and community-based research. UIC's strong focus on urban health, social justice, and applied scholarship closely aligns with the Lab's mission to address aging, sexuality, and mental health.

Dr. Eaton also maintains research privileges at the University of Regina and the University of Toronto, ensuring continuity of existing projects and partnerships and supporting the Lab's cross-border research activities.

The Eaton Lab is currently engaged in several active research projects, including recently published protocols for:




The Men's Sex Survey

Heterosexual men who have sex with men (H-MSM) are a unique population that experience a lack of concordance between their sexual identity, attractions, and behaviors. We are currently surveying diverse groups of men to better understand the unique perspectives and experiences of H-MSM.

3 Infections, 1 Fight: A Community Response

Using hotspot maps generated from ReportNeedles.ca, the project deploys targeted pop-up interventions offering peer-led education on PrEP and PEP, Point-of-care (POC) testing for HIV, syphilis, and Hep C, and connection to follow up care.

We have coompleted two scoping reviews on co-response and civilian-led response and have just completed data collection on key informant interviews regarding practices in the field.
