From the Editor:

Well here is another edition of our village newsletter, unsurprisingly with limited news. However, I do hope you enjoy reading what I have been able to put together while we are still locked down in Wales. Let us all hope that things have improved by October so I can report on some exciting events and we can all get together to enjoy ourselves.

COVID-19 TESTING

Hundreds of people in Powys with COVID-19 symptoms can now be tested each day thanks to a new partnership between Powys Teaching Health Board, UK Armed Forces, Powys County Council and the Royal Welsh Agricultural Society.

Anyone with symptoms – new continuous cough, fever, or less of sense of taste or smell – can request a home testing kit or can book an appointment at drive-in testing units in the county. These are currently located at Bronllys Hospital, Theatre Hafren in Newtown and the Royal Welsh Showground. Visit the <u>Welsh Government website</u> or call 119, or 18001119 for people with hearing or speech difficulties.

The drive-in testing units are available by appointment only. When fully operational the units will normally accommodate around 10-15 tests per hour.

In Powys, this can currently be booked by emailing <u>powysresourcing@wales</u>.nhs.uk or calling 01874 712600 or by visiting the Health Board website <u>here</u>.

BEWARE OF SCAMS

The NHS Wales Test, Trace, Protect scheme recently launched to help reduce the spread of the virus so, if you are contacted by someone from the service as you have been in close contact with a person who is confirmed as having the virus, you should self-isolate for 14 days, and request a test if you develop symptoms.

Criminals have been taking the opportunity to exploit the COVID-19 pandemic for financial gain. With the launch of this new service it is important to know how to spot the signs if criminals choose to try and take advantage of it.

Contact tracers will NEVER:

- Ask you to dial a premium rate number to speak to them (for example, those starting with 089 or 087)
- Ask you to make any form of payment
- Ask you for any details about your bank account
- Ask you for your social media identities or login details, or those of your contacts
- Ask you for any passwords of PINS, or ask you to setup any over the phone
- Ask you to purchase a product
- Ask you to visit any website that does not belong to the Government or NHS
- Ask you to download any software to your device or ask you to hand over control of your PC, smartphone or tablet.



ST. GWYNOG'S CHURCH

The villagers of Aberhafesp enjoy hearing St. Gwynog's 163 year old turret clock strike every hour. The clock strikes the hours using the tenor bell. It is a very accurate time piece so have you ever wondered how this happens 24/7, 365 days a year?

We have a small team of dedicated volunteers who work on a rota to wind the clock every week and maintain its 7 day movement.

The clock and it's west facing face were restored by Alan Cooper who maintained it from 1999 until his death in 2015. Last October, the movement was thoroughly cleaned.

The clock has a face on the south side of the tower and a second face on the west which are connected by shafts, universal joints and bevel gears. **Thank you to our volunteers**


LOCAL SUPPORT





APPLICATION FOR INTENSIVE PIG REARING UNIT AT BANK FARM, ABERHAFESP

A pre-planning application has been published outlining details for the erection of a livestock building to be located in open fields in front of Bank Farm, Aberhafesp, approximately 300 metres from the crossroads and close to the Fachwen pool. The proposed building will house 1000 pigs that will be reared intensively indoors for twenty weeks before being removed for slaughter in articulated lorries. There are serious concerns regarding the impact of this type of development on both water and soil pollution and the impact of increased traffic on local roads. - Powys County Council no longer publish public comments on Planning Applications on their planning website, this means that Community Councillors are unaware of the feelings of local people towards applications.
- It is therefore suggested that if anyone has comments in support of or objecting to Planning Applications in the area then they should make their views known to the Community Council in addition to entering their comments on the Powys County Council website.
- This is particularly important whilst physical meetings of the Council are on hold.

Please note that it is just as important to communicate support for an application as objections to it so that the Community Council can get a balanced view of local opinion.
