

SKIT: Topic: Genesis 6:11-22

Narrator #1: Have you ever heard some terrifying news and then had to figure out how to share that news with your family or best friends?

Narrator #2: Would they believe you? Would they blame you? Would they think you had gone crazy?

Narrator #1: Five-hundred-year-old Noah struggled with that after hearing from Father God.

Narrator #2: Walking home, Noah might have wondered, "What will my wife and three young sons say when I tell them that Father God has given me 100 years to build a giant boat called an ark?"

Narrator #1: Noah might have entered his house and announced, "Uh, ..., wife, sons, uh, ..., I have some good and bad news. Which would you like to hear first?"

Narrator #2: Perhaps they said, "Let's hear the good news first. What is it?"

Narrator #1: Noah might said, "Remember how pleased Father God was with my Great Grandfather Enoch because he was such a righteous man?"

Narrator #2: His wife might have stated, "Yes, Enoch did such a great job faithfully following all of Father God's directions that he got to go straight to Heaven without having to die first."

2 – LESSON #9: Noah story continues Genesis 6:11-22

Narrator #1: Noah might have said, "Well, ..., uh, ..., that's kind of what will happen to us. Father God said He will reward us because I am such a righteous, blameless, and guilt-free man."

Narrator #2: His wife might have said, "Oh, Noah! I am so proud of you! What is your reward?"

Narrator #1: Nervously, Noah might have said, "Uh, ..., well... Father God is going to give me one hundred years to build a giant boat called an ark."

Narrator #2: His wife might have said, "That's your reward?! Huh! What does Father God intend for you to do with an ark?"

Narrator #1: Noah might have quickly said, "The ark is going to keep all of us safe, plus the wives that our sons will eventually marry."

Narrator #2: Noah adds, "The ark will also preserve a male and female of each kind of animal."

Narrator #1: His wife may have asked, "What are you talking about? What is Father God intending to save us from?"

Narrator #2: Noah might have said, "You see, Father God is filled with anger that all the other people are so wicked, corrupt, and violent. "

3 – LESSON #9: Noah story continues Genesis 6:11-22

Narrator #1: Noah would explain, "So, ..., one hundred years from now, Father God intends to cover the earth with a giant flood that will drown everybody but us."

Narrator #2: We can imagine that his wife and young sons might have started to cry in amazement, confusion, and fright.

Narrator #1: His wife might have asked, "But what about your father and grandfather? They are good men!"

Narrator #2: Noah might have stated, "Father God said that they will die of old age before the flood covers the earth."

Narrator #1: His wife might have asked, "How will you know how to build this ark? After all, you have never done anything like that before."

Narrator #2: Noah might have said, "Father God plans to tell me everything I need to know to keep us safe and protected during this worldwide flood."

Narrator #1: Over the next hundred years, Noah, his sons, and perhaps his father and grandfather worked together to build this giant ark.

Narrator #2: This ark was 510 feet long. In other words, it is the length of one and a half football fields.

Narrator #1: This ark was 85 feet wide. In other words, it was about the width of two school buses.

4 – LESSON #9: Noah story continues Genesis 6:11-22

Narrator #2: If you picture three full-grown giraffes standing one on top of the other, that is how tall this three-story ark was. It was full of rooms, food, and water.

Narrator #1: Thank goodness all people and animals were still vegetarians. That way, the animals wouldn't eat each other or Noah's family.

Narrator #2: Next week, we will hear about the completed ark, the gathering of the animals, and the giant flood that covered the earth.
