

REFORM BLUEPRINT OVERVIEW

The Alabama Prison Reform Proposal is built on a simple, evidence-based belief: when people change, communities become safer. Our five-pillar blueprint provides a clear, structured path for transforming a violent, overcrowded, and costly system into one that protects the public, supports victims, strengthens families, and prepares individuals for successful reentry.

This blueprint is not theoretical — it is rooted in proven practices from state systems that have reduced violence, lowered recidivism, and saved billions in taxpayer costs. Together, these pillars form a coordinated strategy to stabilize prisons, rehabilitate people, modernize operations, and support long-term public safety.

The first step is restoring safety and basic functionality. Alabama's prisons cannot rehabilitate or protect anyone until they are stabilized.

REVIVE ENTRY & STABILIZATION

- Reduce overcrowding and violent conditions
- Strengthen correctional officer staffing and support
- Upgrade medical, mental health, & crisis-response systems
- Implement modern safety technology and surveillance
- Improve facility infrastructure for humane operations
- Intensive individual and group counseling
- Structured addiction, anger, and trauma intervention
- Daily meditation or faith-based reflection
- Physical exercise & structured routines

Rehabilitation is crime prevention. When people gain skills, therapy, and purpose, they are far less likely to reoffend — reducing future victims and long-term incarceration costs.

REHABILITATE

TREATMENT & EDUCATION

- Education pathways: literacy, GED, college, and vocational programs
- Evidence-based counseling (CBT, trauma therapy, addiction treatment)
- AI-supported tutoring and digital learning systems
- Structured programming to change thinking, behavior, and decision-making
- Health, wellness, and mental-stability programs

REBUILD

PREPARE PEOPLE FOR THE WORKFORCE

- Workforce-aligned training: welding, HVAC, electrical, coding, logistics
- Apprenticeships and industry partnerships
- Fair-wage labor reform to ensure dignity and accountability
- Certification programs recognized by Alabama employers
- Financial literacy, digital literacy, and job-readiness training

Rebuild converts tax burdens into tax-paying, job-ready citizens.

RESTORE VICTIMS, FAMILIES, & COMMUNITIES

- Victim-centered accountability and restitution
- Restorative justice pathways for appropriate cases
- Family support: communication access, visitation stability, education
- Trauma-informed programming and community partnerships
- Reentry planning that stabilizes entire communities

Restore ensures that reform does not forget those harmed by crime.
