The Shape Game

If you name it right, you keep the card.

If you make a mistake, give the card back.

Before Reading

- 1. **Sounding Out Support:** Watch for long A words with silent E. If your child is stuck on a word like "plate," remind them the E is silent and makes the A say its name.
- 2. Watch for a-e words related to shapes and actions
- 3. What tools do you need to make the cards?
- 4. Try reading the game rules like you are teaching them to a friend

After Reading

- 1. Summarize the steps of the shape game
- 2. Why is it helpful to take turns and keep score?
- 3. What could make this game even more fun?
- 4. Skill Check: Find and underline six a-e words in the story
- 5. **Fluency Tip:** Read the story again using your "teacher voice" to explain each part clearly!

Make your own set of shape cards at home. Use tape, plates, or rulers to trace and cut out shapes. Write the name on each card and play with a family member or classmate.
