Before Reading

During Reading

- 1. **Sounding Out Support: Sounding Out Support:** Practice stretching the /ow/ sound in words like *growl* and *crowd*. Help children feel how the sound matches the strong feeling behind a growl!
- 2. Watch for target skill words that explain why and how animals growl.
- 3. Which animals growl to protect their space?
- 4. Read the final line with a clear and serious tone, like giving good advice.

After Reading

- 1. Retell why animals growl and how it helps them stay safe.
- 2. Why is it important for people to stay away when they hear a growl?
- 3. What would you do if you saw a dog or wild animal growl?

- 5. **Fluency Tip:** Read it again using a deep, powerful voice—just like a warning growl!
