
"This nonfiction story explains how birds use their beaks. Look for 'ir' words like 'bird,' 'chirp,' and 'dirt' as you explore how birds live!"



How Birds Use Their Beaks

Birds use their beaks to eat, build, and chirp.

Each kind of bird has a beak made for its job.

Long, thin beaks help birds sip nectar from flowers.

Short, firm beaks help birds crack seeds and nuts.

Some birds dig in the dirt with their beaks to find bugs.

Others use their beaks to stir twigs and build a nest.

Birds need strong beaks to live and thrive.

- 2. Watch for ir words that describe how birds survive
- 3. What does each beak shape help a bird do?
- 4. Read the final line like you're giving a wildlife fact

After Reading

- 1. Retell two or three ways birds use their beaks
- 2. Why is a strong beak important to a bird's life?
- 3. If you were a bird, what kind of beak would you want and why?
- 4. Skill Check: Highlight six "ir" words in the passage
- 5. Fluency Tip: Read it again like a nature guide teaching about birds
