Genre: Realistic Fiction

High-Frequency Words: had, his, back, in, was, got

Before Reading

1. Remind them of the target skill: This story has words that end with -sh, -th, -ch, or -ck.

- 2. Have you ever eaten lunch outside?
- 3. What might happen if a bug tries to join your lunch?

During Reading

- 1. **Sounding Out Support:** For tricky words like *smack* or *patch*, help the reader stretch the short vowel, then blend the ending digraph.
- 2. Watch for digraph endings like -sh, -ch, -ck, and -th.
- 3. What did Josh do when he saw the bug?
- 4. Read the line *Smack!* like it's really happening!

After Reading

- 1. What happened first, next, and last with Josh's sandwich?
- 2. Why do you think the bug liked Josh's lunch?
- 3. How did Josh solve the problem in the end?
- 4. Highlight 5 words that end in -sh, -ch, -ck, or -th.
- 5. Fluency Tip: Read again using big expression during the bug scene!

Activity Idea

Draw Josh holding his sandwich. Add the bug flying off. Label parts of the scene with words like *Josh*, *lunch*, *back*, *smack*, or *patch*. Then write a sentence about what Josh might eat next time instead.

Coaching Tip

Let your child have fun acting out sound words like *smack* or *whirr*—it builds memory and fluency while making reading exciting!
