- 2. What motivates each character to act, and how is fear described in both?
- 3. How do the settings create tension in each story?

After Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. What similarities do both characters share in how they deal with fear?
- 2. Which story shows a more immediate kind of bravery, and which one shows thoughtful bravery?
- 3. How does the wide illustration enhance your understanding of the fear and bravery in *Through the Ice Tunnel*?

Activity Idea

Have students create a Venn diagram comparing and contrasting the two stories' approaches to courage. Then, write a paragraph explaining how different situations can bring out different types of bravery, using evidence from both stories and the illustration.
