

What's in a Weather Report?

Heading: What's in a Weather Report?

Every day, people check the weather report. But what is a weather report, and how do we read it?

Subheading: Temperature

The temperature tells how hot or cold it is outside. A weather report might say, "Today will be 70 degrees." That means it is warm.

Subheading: Wind and Rain

Weather reports tell if it will rain, snow, or be windy. You might see pictures, like clouds or raindrops, to show what kind of day it will be.

Subheading: What to Wear

Some weather reports give advice. If it will rain, they may show a picture of an umbrella. If it's cold, you may see a hat and gloves.

After Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. Why is it helpful to have text features in a weather report?
- 2. Which feature helped you the most: headings, pictures, or bold print?
- 3. How would the report be different without those features?

Activity Idea

Have students create their own weather report using headings, a temperature, a weather symbol, and a clothing suggestion. They can illustrate a scene and write a short report, using bold or underlined words for key information. Then they can present it to the class like meteorologists!
