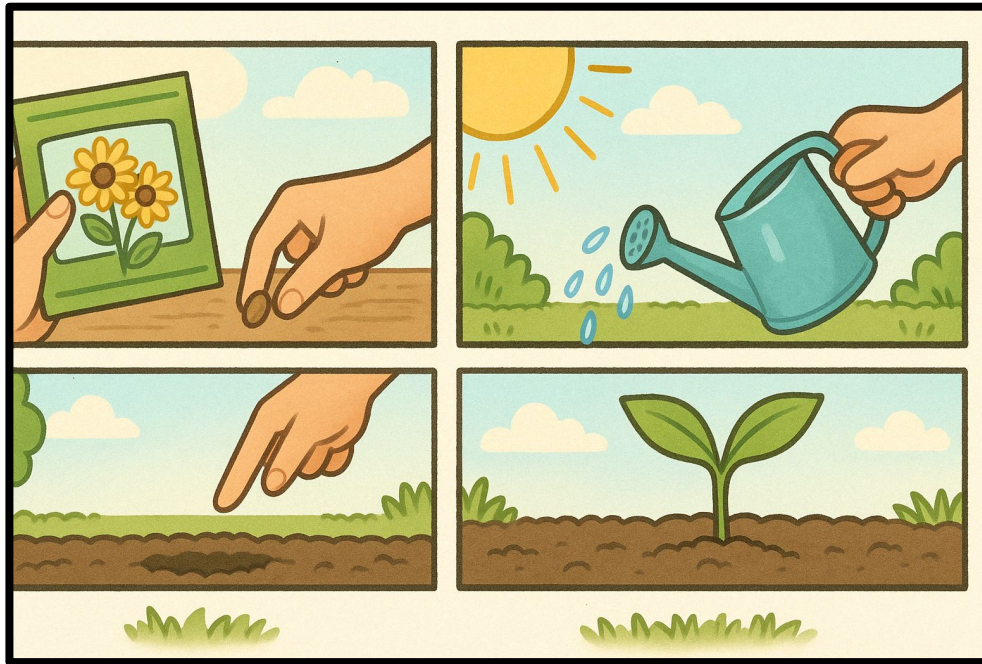


# Reading Comprehension Worksheet: Using Text Features

## How-to Plant a Seed

### Heading: How-to: Plant a Seed

Have you ever wanted to grow a plant? Here are the steps to plant a seed and help it grow strong.

### Subheading: Step 1 - Pick Your Seed

Choose a seed you want to grow. It might be a flower, a vegetable, or a tree. Look at the packet to learn more.

### Subheading: Step 2 - Find the Right Spot

Seeds need sunlight and space. Find a place with soft soil and sunshine. Dig a small hole with your finger.

### Subheading: Step 3 - Water It Gently

After planting, water your seed. Don't flood it! Use just enough water to make the soil damp.

### Subheading: Step 4 - Watch It Grow

Now, wait and watch. Your seed will sprout in a few days. Keep watering it when the soil is dry.

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## During Reading Discussion Questions

1. What do the subheadings tell you?
  2. What step are we on right now?
  3. What does the picture show us?
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## After Reading Discussion Questions

1. How did the text features help you follow the steps?
  2. Which feature (bold words, subheadings, captions) helped you most?
  3. Could you follow these steps without the text features?
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## Activity Idea

Give each student a printed version of the text with the text features removed. Then give them the same text with the features included. Ask students to compare both versions and discuss which one is easier to understand and why. Finish by planting a real seed together in class and labeling each step with a heading card!
