Why Dogs Help People

Sasha loved dogs, especially her neighbor's big golden retriever named Max. One day, Sasha noticed Max wearing a special vest. Her neighbor explained that Max was a **service dog**—a dog trained to help people.

There are many reasons dogs help people. One reason is that some dogs help people **see**. These dogs are called **guide dogs**. They help people who are blind cross streets, walk through busy areas, and stay safe.

Another reason dogs help people is because they can make people feel **calm**. Some people feel very nervous or scared in crowds or new places. Special dogs are trained to stay close to these people and help them feel safe.

Dogs also help in **emergencies**. Some dogs work with police officers or firefighters. These dogs can find people who are lost or help search through buildings.

Sasha thought Max was just a friendly pet, but now she saw him as a hero. She gave him a big hug and said, "Thanks, Max!"

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Activity Idea

Students can draw a picture of a working dog in action—helping someone cross the street, staying close in a crowd, or working with a firefighter. Then, have students write a sentence underneath: "Dogs help people by..." to reinforce the author's point and the reasons that support it.
