Heading: Exploring an Ocean Map

When you look at an ocean map, it may seem like a big, blue puzzle. But if you learn how to read it, you can discover all kinds of information.

Subheading: What Are Ocean Maps?

Ocean maps are special maps that show the parts of the sea and what lies beneath. They include features like islands, underwater mountains, and ocean currents. Some maps even use colors to show where the water is deep or shallow.

Subheading: Reading a Map Key

Most ocean maps include a **map key**. The map key tells you what the symbols mean. For example, a triangle might mean an underwater volcano, and a star might show a famous shipwreck.

Subheading: Using the Compass Rose

A compass rose shows you direction. It usually points north, south, east, and west. When you use it, you can tell where something is on the map.
