Discussion Questions Before Reading

- What kinds of adventures have you had? Have you ever found something unexpected?
- 2. Why do you think old trees might have secrets? What could they hide?
- 3. How do you think Lena will react when she finds the secret door?

Discussion Questions During Reading

- 1. How did Lena's discovery of the map change her adventure?
- 2. What do you think the symbols on the map represent?
- 3. Why is the key Lena finds so important to the story?

Discussion Questions After Reading

- 1. What do you think Lena will do next with the key she found?
- 2. Why do you think the old oak tree had a secret room? What might it represent?
- 3. How do Lena's discoveries help her grow as a character?

Activity Idea

Have students create a "Secret Adventure Map." In this activity, students will design their own treasure maps, marking symbols or clues that lead to a secret location in their classroom or outside. Afterward, they will write a short story explaining what their treasure is and how they discovered it. This activity allows students to apply what they've read to their own creative process, practicing mapping, symbolism, and writing skills while reinforcing their understanding of the theme.
