- 1. Have you ever found something old or mysterious in your house or someone else's?
- 2. What do you think a treasure is?
- 3. Why might someone hide something in a jar or a box?

### **During Reading Discussion Questions**

- 1. What clues helped Laila and Mateo follow the map?
- 2. How did Mateo feel about the search at first? Did he change?
- 3. What do the objects in the lunchbox tell us about the girl from the past?

#### **After Reading Discussion Questions**

- 1. Why did Laila say, "That wasn't junk. That was history"?
- 2. How do you think finding the lunchbox changed how Laila saw the world?
- 3. What are some ways we can remember important people or events from the past?

#### **Activity Idea**

Invite students to create their own "Memory Treasure Jar." Provide each child with a plastic jar or paper cup. Have them draw or write about 2–3 personal items or memories they'd want someone in the future to discover. Students can decorate the jar and present what makes their items meaningful. This encourages reflection on history and personal storytelling while reinforcing the theme of the story.
