#### During Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. How do you think Milo felt when he saw his beads were gone?
- 2. Why do you think Milo chose to tell Ms. Lane instead of getting angry?
- 3. What surprised you about how Milo handled the situation?

#### **After Reading Discussion Questions**

- 1. What is the central lesson Milo learns? What clues helped you figure it out?
- 2. How did Milo's kindness and forgiveness change the ending of the story? Can you think of a time in your life when someone forgave you or you forgave someone?

#### Activity Idea

Have students create their own version of a "forgiveness art piece." Give them paper and drawing tools to design a picture that shows two characters working through a problem together. Then, they write one or two sentences explaining the lesson their drawing teaches, connecting it back to Milo and Zara's story.
