# How to Stay Safe in a Thunderstorm

### What Is a Thunderstorm?

A thunderstorm is a type of weather with thunder, lightning, wind, and rain. Thunderstorms can be dangerous, especially if you're outside when one begins.

## Step 1: Go Indoors Right Away

If you hear thunder or see lightning, go inside a building or car immediately. Being outside can be unsafe during a storm.

## Step 2: Stay Away from Water

Do not swim or take a bath during a thunderstorm. Water can carry electricity, and lightning can travel through pipes.

## Step 3: Don't Use Electronics

Unplug your devices if possible, and stay off wired phones. Lightning can travel through power lines and cause damage.

## Step 4: Wait for the All Clear

Stay indoors until at least 30 minutes after the last sound of thunder. This helps make sure the storm has passed.

Thunderstorms may be loud and sudden, but by following steps and paying attention to warnings, you can stay safe.
