- 2. Why do you think the bamboo only grew after Kenji showed patience?
- 3. How is this story like a fable or a myth you may have read before?

Activity Idea

Have students create a "Patience Tree" bulletin board. Each student writes one way they've had to be patient in their lives on a leaf-shaped cutout. Then, build a classroom tree out of brown paper and attach the leaves to its branches. Reflect together on how patience helps us grow, just like Kenji.
