
Reading Comprehension Worksheet: Story Structure

Before Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. Have you ever received a message that surprised or encouraged you?
- What does it mean when someone sees things in you that you don't see in yourself?
- 3. How do you think a story with multiple short chapters might feel different than one long passage?

During Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. What happens in each chapter that makes Ava stop and think?
- 2. How do the notes help Ava see herself differently?
- 3. What is Ryan's reason for writing the notes?

After Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. How does each chapter build the story and lead to the final message?
- 2. How would the story be different if the author didn't include all three notes?
- 3. What does the structure teach us about growth happening in small steps?

Activity Idea

Have students write "3 Chapter Snapshots" about a time they discovered something new about themselves. Each "chapter" should be one paragraph long and include a key event that changed how they felt or thought. Encourage them to title each section and share how the story built to a bigger realization—just like Ava's.
