#### **Before Reading Discussion Questions**

- 1. What's your opinion about camping?
- Have you ever judged something before trying it?
- 3. Why might a character's point of view change in a story?

## **During Reading Discussion Questions**

- 1. What clues tell us that Jasper is uncomfortable at first?
- What part of the story starts to change his feelings?
- 3. How do his actions reflect this change?

#### After Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. How does Jasper's experience help him grow or connect with others?
- What is your own point of view on camping—how does it compare to Jasper's?
- 3. Why is it helpful to notice a character's perspective in a story?

#### **Activity Idea**

Have students complete a "**Point of View Reflection Card.**" One side says *Jasper's Point of View* and includes a sentence for the beginning and end of the story. The other side says *My Point of View* and includes a sentence about how the student feels about camping (or another shared experience). Students then compare how and why their perspective is similar or different.
