After Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. What does the story teach about friendship and change?
- 2. How did the characters' actions create a "bridge" between them?
- 3. What would have happened if Noah never shared his drawing?

Activity Idea

Invite students to create a "**Bridge Drawing**" with a partner. Each person draws something that represents a part of their own identity (e.g., hometown, interests, favorite memories). Then, they connect their drawings with a bridge and write a few sentences about how friendship can connect people with different backgrounds—just like Noah and Elijah.
