- 1. What does Jules' reaction tell you about how important the sketchbook was to her?
- 2. What clues show that she's struggling to start again?
- 3. What role does her brother play in helping her?

After Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. What is the theme or message of this story?
- 2. What do Jules' actions at the end show about her growth?
- 3. How could someone apply the message of this story to their own life?

Activity Idea

Ask students to create a "Theme Poster" based on the story. They should draw one symbol (like Jules' new dragon) and write a short paragraph explaining how that symbol represents the story's theme about starting over after a setback.
